## DOUGHTY TRAWLERS LIE IDLE AT THE VANCOUVER WHARVES

**SPECULATION AS TO THE BRITISH COLUMBIA FISHERIES COMPANY STARTING UP AGAIN WITH RENEWED CAPITAL FROM SHAREHOLDERS.**

Vancouver, Nov. 20.—Occasionally enquiry is made about the two trawlers Triumph and Canada, which lie so dismally unoccupied at the boat wharves beyond the G. T. P. docks on Vancouver's waterfront. They bear on their funnels the letters B. C. F., which stand for B. C. Fisheries. There is said to be good news ahead for these hardy little ships, which travelled all the way from the North Sea to the Pacific to begin fishing out here for the new company started but a short time ago.

According to cables received from London, England, it is generally believed almost certain the B. C. Fisheries, Ltd., one of the largest fishing concerns operating in the waters of this province, which was placed in the hands of a receiver recently at Vancouver, is to continue the business. At a special meeting of the shareholders, held in the old country a few days ago, Sir George Doughty, the great English fish magnate who organized the company here, said he estimated \$250,000 would suffice to enable them to earn substantial profits.

The B. C. Fisheries, Ltd., has extensive interests in British Columbia waters. The headquarters of the fishing fleet are at Alford Bay, on the Queen Charlotte

Islands. There the company erected in the summer of 1912 the largest cannery in British Columbia, a huge fertilizer plant and a number of smaller buildings. Across the inlet at Skidegate a fine oil station was built, at which the dog fish were put through a process. Three trawlers, the Canada, Triumph and Imbricaria, are in the possession of the company, as well as the tug Alford, the big gasoline schooner Gryme, formerly the Edrie, and a number of smaller craft.

#### Czar Consents to Divorce.

Christiania, Nov. 20.—The Russian Emperor, it is stated, has consented to the divorce of Princess Marie, formerly Grand Duchess Marie Pavlovna, and Prince William of Sweden. Her beautiful palace at Stockholm, the Emperor's wedding gift, will go to her son, Prince Lennard.

#### Mr. Hamilton Nominated.

Victoria, Nov. 20.—Alexander Hamilton of Pender Island was yesterday nominated by the Liberals of the Islands constituency to contest the by-election rendered necessary by the resignation of Mr. Justice McPhillips.

## STANLEY CUP WILL GO TO CHAMPIONS

**Trustees of Trophy Will Not Object to Number of Inter-League Games.**

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—The Stanley cup trustees have no objection to placing the famous old trophy, now held by the Quebec club, up for the world's hockey series, planned by the N. H. A. and the Coast League. Trustee William Foran, in speaking of putting up the old cup, said that the trophy represented the hockey championship of Canada, and that the trustees had no objection how many games the teams wished to play for it, providing that the games were for the hockey championship of Canada and the club holding the trophy take the proper care of it.

This announcement will do away with any plans for the shelving of the battered piece of silverware presented by Lord Stanley in the early days of hockey, and this news will be received with general approval, the hockey fans not wishing to see the battered old mug, and all its associations with gone days, consigned to the scrap heap.

## QUEENSTOWN WHARF READY FOR STEAMERS

**Main Wharf Sixty Feet by Forty with Frame Freight Shed Sixteen by Sixteen.**

The Dominion government wharf at Queenstown is about completed, the finishing touches being applied this week and large steamers can now tie up with perfect safety at any stage of the tide, says the Queen Charlotte Islander. The wharf is one of the most substantial in Northern British Columbia and the contractor, Mr. Gillett, has every reason to feel proud over the structure, even although many disadvantages were encountered all the way through.

The approach is 650 feet long, composed of 65 bents 16 feet wide, and three piles to a bent. The main wharf is 60x40 feet. The total number of piles used was 721 and 100,000 feet of lumber has been used in the upper structure of the wharf, all of which was supplied from W. L. Barton's local sawmill. A frame freight shed 16x16 feet has been erected on the wharf, and later on a float for small craft and a guard railing will be built. The depth of water at low tide is 20 feet.

#### Rifle Factory for Ottawa.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—It is stated that the Ross Rifle Company of Quebec is preparing to erect a factory near the new Connaught rifle ranges, eight miles west of the capital. This factory would be of considerable size and would be located where it would be convenient to the ranges. This company manufactures the rifles and ammunition used by the Canadian troops and it would be a big advantage to be close to the big ranges for testing purposes.

#### Cathedral for Edmonton.

Edmonton, Nov. 20.—A Catholic cathedral, costing in the neighborhood of half a million dollars, and an archbishop's residence in keeping with the architectural beauty of the cathedral, will be built in Edmonton early next spring, according to the announcement of His Grace Archbishop Legal of St. Albert last night.

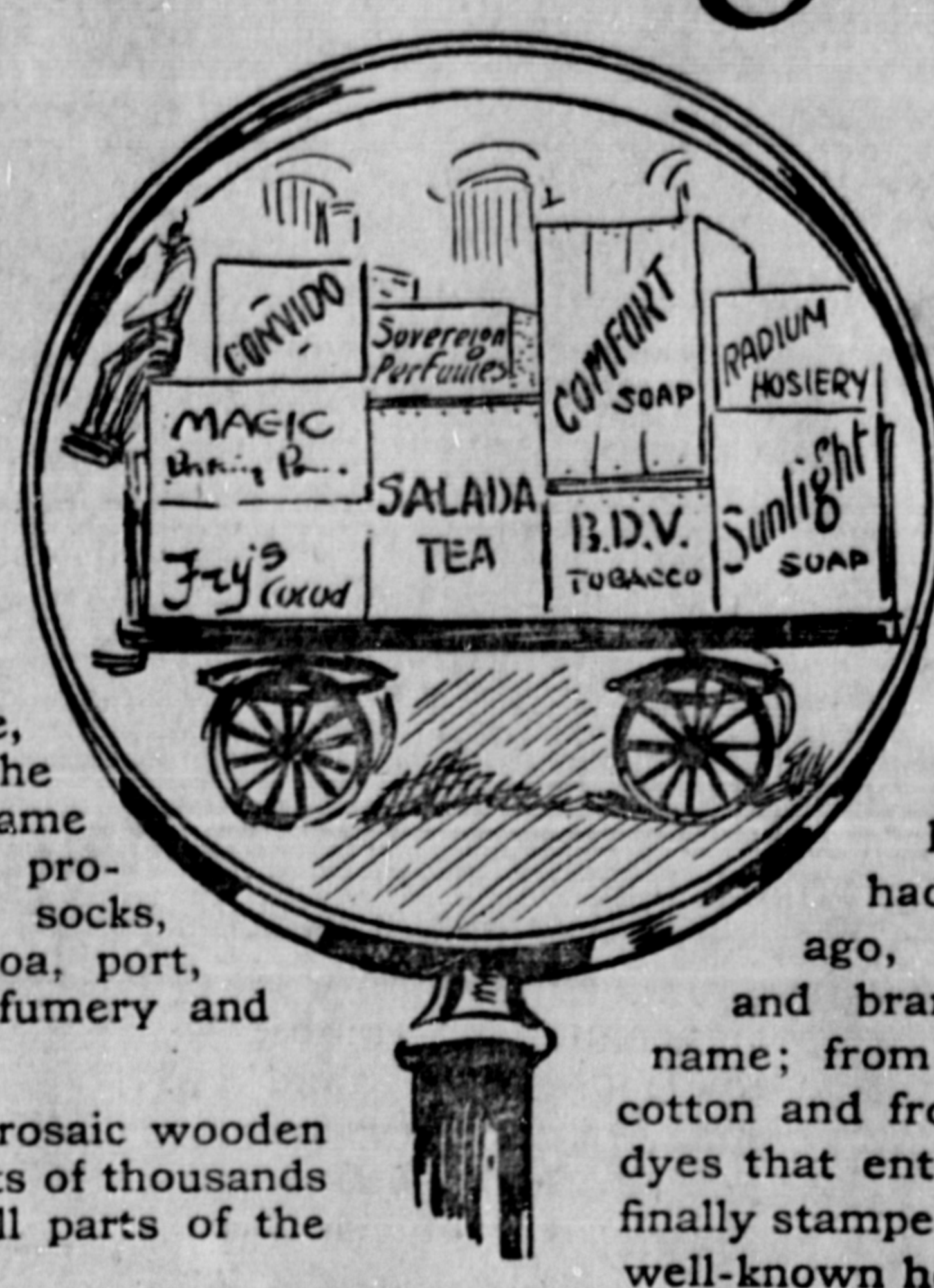
## The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.



The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.

The tea was gathered by swart-skinned natives of the romantic island of Ceylon; from sunny Portugal the luscious, big grapes had been gathered years ago, fermented, bottled and branded with a famous name; from Egypt had come the cotton and from South America the dyes that entered into the product finally stamped with the brand of a well-known hosiery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.
