

UNIONISTS CARRY WAR INTO NATIONALISTS' CAMP

ONE STEFANSSON BOAT KNOWN TO BE LOST---JUSTICE CLEMENTS IS ORDERED TO REFUND

BONAR LAW DEFIES GOVERNMENT TO ARREST SIR EDWARD CARSON

IMMENSE MEETING IN DUBLIN OF SOUTHERN IRISH UNIONISTS—STREET FIGHTS, WINDOW SMASHING, SHOOTING—ONE WOMAN WOUNDED

Dublin, Nov. 29.—Bonar Law and Sir Edward Carson arrived here yesterday to meet Unionist delegations from the south of Ireland. These southern Irish Unionists refuse to accept any compromise which, while exempting Ulster, will hand the Unionist minorities of the rest of Ireland over to what they call Nationalist domination.

This was the chief difficulty Mr. Bonar Law had to face when he addressed the immense meeting held here last night. In his address he argued that the attitude of Ulster alone justified the demand for an appeal to the

country. He challenged the government, if they believed they had the moral right behind them, to arrest Sir Edward Carson and to suppress the armed movement in Ulster. This statement was wildly cheered.

The streets were densely crowded, both Nationalists and Unionists being out in strong force and making demonstrations. The students marched in procession, smashing the windows of tram cars and buildings and much damage was done. Some shots were fired and one woman was wounded. The police were kept busy all night stopping the various affrays.

JUSTICE CLEMENTS GUILTY OF FRAUD

Wrongfully Obtained Money from Crown by Misrepresenting Place of Residence

Vancouver, Nov. 29.—Mr. Justice Cassels, of the Exchequer court, yesterday handed down judgment in the case against Mr. Justice Clements, of the British Columbia Supreme Court, for the recovery of \$4,550 wrongfully obtained from the crown by fraudulently representing his residence to be Grand Forks, B.C., while actually he was living in Vancouver. He finds that Mr. Justice Clements' residence is in Vancouver and the sum in question must be refunded to the crown with interest. He finds also that Mr. Justice Clements was guilty of fraud.

ONE OF STEFANSSON'S BOATS CRUSHED IN ICE

Power Schooner Mary Sachs Was Smashed Into Splinters but all Her Crew Escaped

Nome, Nov. 29.—The power schooner Mary Sachs, one of the boats of the Stefansson Canadian Arctic exploration expedition, was wrecked in the ice off the Arctic Coast of Alaska, according to a letter just received from Peter Barnard, captain of the vessel. The ice crushed the boat into small bits and all the provisions and scientific instruments were lost. No details. It is believed all the members of the crew escaped, as no reference is made to any loss of life. The letter contains no word concerning the Karluk and the Alaska. The shipwrecked crew are sheltered with the natives.

LACK OF DISCIPLINE

Inadequate Equipment of Pacific Coast Steamer President.

San Francisco, Nov. 29.—Lack of discipline and inadequate equipment is charged against the Pacific Coast Company's steamer President by passengers who were on board during Wednesday night's storm, when the fourth officer, two seamen and a passenger were blown overboard. This happened in a heavy blow north of Cape Blanco. The company stands by its officers and declares they did their duty according to their best judgment.

NEW STEAMER LINE

From Maritime Provinces to British Columbia Ports.

Quebec, Nov. 29.—The Board of Trade favors the establishment of a steamship line via the Panama Canal to British Columbia ports and calls on the Dominion government to subsidize such a service if necessary.

This is a picture of James Larkin, the labor agitator, who was the leader of the Dublin strikers, before and after he has had his moustache shaved off. He was imprisoned in Dublin and the people making a martyr of him the government found it politic to release him. He immediately left the starving strikers in Dublin to "carry the fiery cross to England" and order a general strike. He has hauled down his flag in view of the determined hostility of the English trade-unionists to his drastic plans. As was stated in one of the dispatches to the Daily News, "The Larkin rocket has gone up and come down a dead squib, so far as its effect on British labor is concerned."

PRINCE RUPERT BEST CITY ON THE PACIFIC COAST TO-DAY

MAYOR PATTULLO SPEAKS OPTIMISTICALLY OF HOME CITY—INTERESTED PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT IN CITY FINANCES

"We are lucky to be living in Prince Rupert," remarked the mayor to The Daily News this morning, and he spoke with enthusiasm. "The more I saw of the cities down the coast the better I realized that Prince Rupert is the best of them all. There are more people talking of the north now than ever before. As I have previously intimated no city has a better outlook for the immediate future than we have."

The mayor came in on this morning's boat from Victoria, where he has been soliciting pro-

vincial interest in the financing of the city. The mayor had interviews with Premier McBride, the Hon. W. R. Ross, and another meeting with the whole executive Council. The final reply to these negotiations will be given the city next week.

While in the south Mayor Pattullo visited Tacoma and Seattle, and was surprised at the number of men out of employment. Conditions are so much worse financially in the other towns that he could not help feeling a pride in Prince Rupert.

POSTAL SERVICE TO FRASER LAKE NEEDED

Mail Between Francois and Fraser Now Goes by Vancouver and Ashcroft.

It is understood the post office department is considering the establishment of a through mail service along the line of the G. T. P. Although Francois Lake and Fraser Lake post offices are but a few miles apart, it is now necessary to send letters from one point to the other around by Vancouver and Ashcroft. There is great need for a service to bridge the gap, and it is to be hoped the postal authorities will institute through mails without delay.—Omineca Miner.

One of them last night fastened herself to a chair in Caxton Hall with chains and padlock, from which point of vantage she shrieked "Votes for Women." Joseph Pease, M. P., was forced to suspend his speech until the suffragette was removed after smashing the chair to release her.

Two suffragettes, who resolutely refused to give their names, were committed for trial at Leeds charged with arson.
