(Special to The Daily News.) Hoquiam, Wash., Dec. 2.—A four masted schooner, either the Bilboa or the Espada, and probably the former, is ashore outside Grays Harbor jetty. It will be a total wreck. Five of the crew have been taken off and the remainder will be moved to safety.

DYNAMITERS INDICTED

Confession of Secretary Gives Grand Jury Chance

Indianapolis, Dec. 2.—Harry Jones, secretary and treasurer of the International Association of Bridge & Structural Iron Workers, and George E. Davis, an iron worker, were indicted on charges of conspiracy to transport unlawfully dynamite and nitroglycerine by the federal grand jury, which reported yesterday. The indictments were based on Davis' alleged confession.

SYLVIA AT MILAN

Tells Italian Women About Militant Methods

Milan, Dec. 2.—Miss Sylvia Pankhurst, one of the leaders of the English suffragettes, was the guest yesterday of a number of prominent Italian women, before whom she delivered a lecture on the history of militant suffragism in Great Britain.

St. Mary's, Ont., Dec. 2.—Gilbert H. McIntyre, ex-M.P. for South Perth, and former deputy speaker of the House of Commons, died at his home yesterday morning, aged 60, after an illness of several weeks. He was elected to Parliament in 1904 and 1908.

VETERANS MULTIPLY

Astonishing Number Claim the Bounty for Fenian Raid

Ottawa, Nov. 30.—Fenian Raid veterans seem to be multiplying as the years roll on. Forty-five years have passed since the invaders were repelled, and it has been estimated that no more than ten thousand men took up arms in defence of Canada. Now over four thousand veterans have been paid the sum of one hundred dollars by the government by the Bounty Act of a couple of sessions ago. There are ten thousand applications for the bounty still to be passed upon. The bulk of these will likely be rejected.
