MAYOR PATTULLO IN FAVOR OF HYDRO-ELEC. OFFER

mean an investment of \$195,000. Installing a sub-station and distributing plant for the agreement just submitted would require an investment of \$60,000.

Ald. Kerr asked where it was proposed to build the diesel oil plant in case that scheme is gone on with.

Supt. Duncan—Corner of McBride and Ninth Avenue. That is the best centre for distribution.

Ald. Kerr thought it ought to be on the waterfront in Section Two.

In answer to Ald. Naden, Supt. Duncan said that with an increase in the use of power the rates with a city plant would come down faster than with the purchased power.

Ald. Maitland said he did not think the city could buy power when they had already sold debentures for their own hydro-electric scheme.

Mayor Pattullo said there were not sufficient debentures sold on that scheme to even furnish the waterworks.

Supt. Duncan said that by using the company's power under the proposed rates the city would be able to cut down the present price of power by one-third. When the amount used is over 500 h.p., which will be next winter, the cost could be cut another half cent per k.w. In answer to Ald. Maitland he said if the city invested \$150,000 they could furnish the power just as cheap and eventually cheaper. The first year or two it would cost more.

Ald. McCaffery—If we accept that agreement it means that we will not develop our own power until such time as we require more than 3000 h.p.

The mayor suggested submitting the agreement to another lawyer and another engineer before submitting it to the electors.

The council adjourned until Friday afternoon.

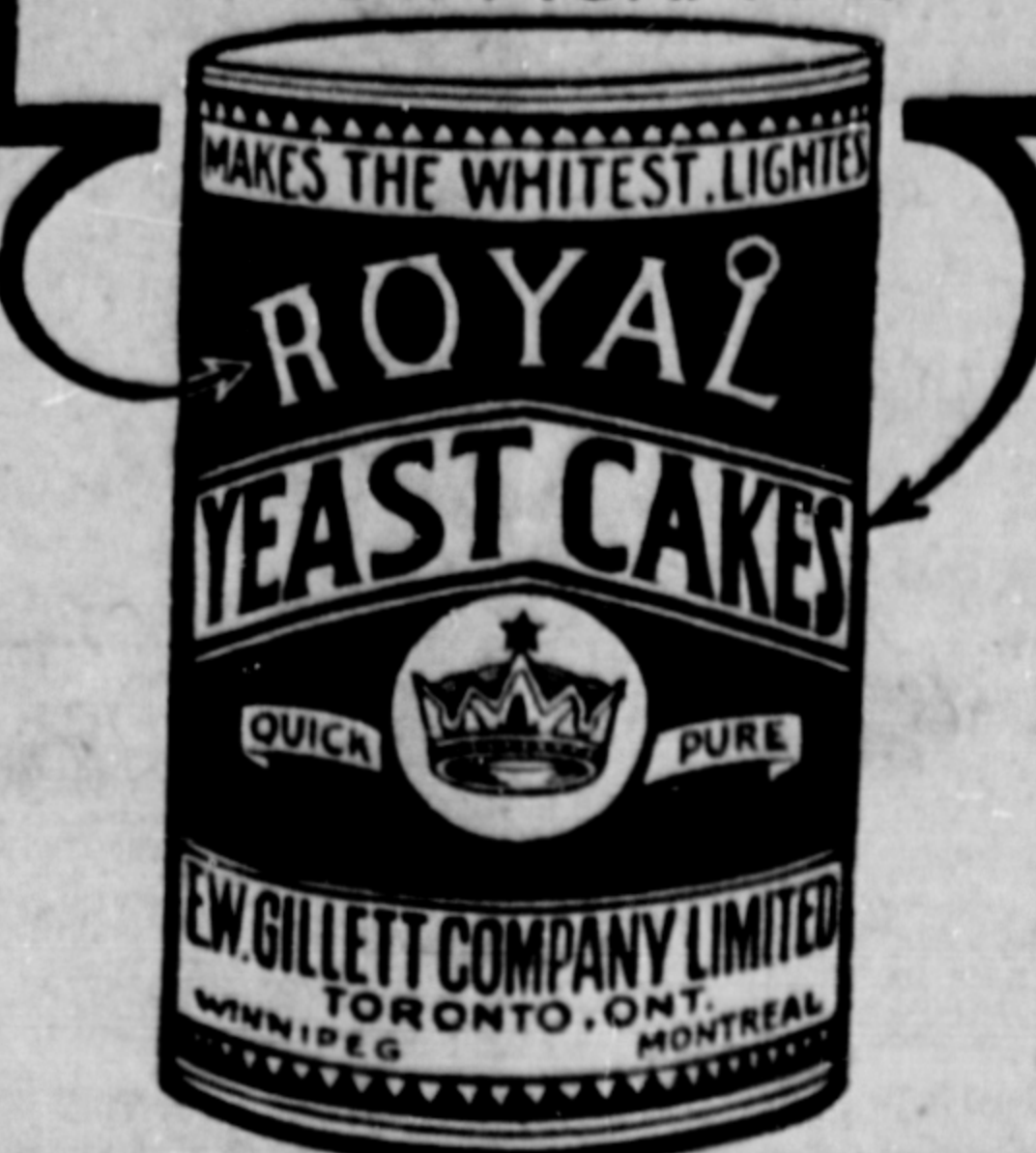

TORY REVOLUTIONARY ON HOME RULE

Proposal that Opposition Shall Render Government of the Country Impossible

London, Dec. 4.—While the movement for the conciliation of Ulster gains ground daily among the Liberals, one section of the Unionists is moving toward uncompromising resistance.

J. C. Garvin, whose influence in dictating Unionist tactics is undeniable, has shown his recent declaration of truce is at an end by outlining in yesterday's Observer the Tory revolutionary policy.

He says that in addition to Unionists resigning from the Territorials and using all their influence to prevent recruits joining every attempt should be made to stop the business of the house of commons by volleys and drowning the debate.

"This method, simple as it seems, would be irresistible. If pursued with sufficient unanimity, coolness and determination, it would bring the house of commons to a standstill.

"If this fails, the peers should make a last effort to force dissolution by throwing out all measures, including the annual army bill."

The growth of the conciliation movement among the Liberals is shown in a significant article by W. H. Massingham in today's Daily News. He declares that if the resistance of the Ulster people is overcome by force it will stiffen into an obstinacy that may make Redmond's task impossible and will sooner or later find the majority of British voters on its side.

"It is easy to talk of shooting these people. It will be harder to do. It will be specially odious to Liberals."

He regrets that the prime minister did not approach a little nearer the inevitable task of reconciling Ulster. "If Premier Asquith admits, as we all admit, that the home rule bill is an imperfect instrument for accomplishing the task of perfecting and democratizing the government of the United Kingdom, and that it imparts rather a lopsided air to parliamentary representation, it is up to him to suggest the way in which he proposes to solve this problem of devolution."
