GAMPP'S MEETING TENDERS S. M. NEWTON THE NOMINATION

putting it into a nutshell so many times that the meeting began to think even a cocoa nut shell would not hold it all. For a good portion of the evening the meeting was not getting anywhere. Everyone was asking questions which no one appeared able to answer until Mr. A. W. Agnew, a representative of the P. R. Hydro-Electric Co., dropped in. He gave the meeting a lot of information. He said that when the peah load is over 500 h.p. the gross rate per k.w. would be 1 1/2c to the city under the proposed agreement. This power would have to be stepped down to 2,300 or 4000 volts in which there would be a slight loss. In case of development at Woodworth Lake it would also have to be stepped down. With a deisel oil plant there would be no stepping down. The distaluting losses would be identical in all three schemes. \$45,000 of the \$60,000 spoken of was for line extensions which could be done without in case of a shortage of one. Only \$15,000 is for the sub-station. The present cost of power is too high; no industry can afford to pay it. With the agreement the city could sell light at 6, 7 and 8c per k.w. instead of 18c as at present and power could be sold at an average cost of 2c. These rates are based on the superintendent's figures. The city can demand a revision of the rates every five years. The estimate of Mr Thompson for the Woodworth Lake development was a skeleton estimate. No allowance was made for incidentals. It would really cost \$200,000. With fixed charges on that amount the city would find that the fixed charges alone would make a cost of \$26 per annum on every horsepower developed. If the company goes ahead with their development they will be spending a million dollars in this district that is not costing the workingman a cent. There were men in the room who know that the working conditions, under that company are the very best.

Mr. Cuthbert intimated that the city could get power on the Naas, sufficient to supply the whole district. Mr. Agnew said the cost of transmission across the canals would make it prohibitive. Ald. Maitland wanted the candidate selection to be left to a down town meeting. The meeting finally got around to the candidates. The chairman thought differently. He wanted action and took occasion to air his own

grievances over not being able to get roads and water, out in section seven, where he has improved his property.

Ald. Tom Maitland then announced that he had been requested by Mr. Manson to say that he would not stand for the mayoralty.

Ald. Douglas—Then we know who is going to carry our banner to victory—Newton.

Applause led by Neil McKay. After a number of suggestions and half made motions it was moved and carried that a committee interview S. M. Newton and tender him the nomination. Fully 25 % of those present voted for the motion.

The committee is Messrs. Gampp, Fred Shaw and Derry.

It was then moved that H. Douglas be appointed treasurer to pass the hat for campaign funds. Between the moving and the passing of the motion there was a general exodus including one or two of the prominent speakers.

Another meeting will be called next week.

Remarks Picked at Random

H. Douglas—If the city could buy the machinery on time we might finance the Woodworth Lake scheme for \$100,000.

A. H. Allison—I believe in municipal ownership. I have yet to be shown that this agreement is a better scheme.

Fred Shaw—If it costs us \$60,000 for a distributing plant and we lose our present plant merely to get our power at 14c per k.w. hour I can't see we are any ahead.

Fred Shaw—If this company gets a contract now they will then want to grab our street railway franchise.

Shaw—If the company sells power cheaper here it is to help Port Edward. We have got to watch that thing. I have got every dollar of mine invested here. Hard earns!

Agnew—Under the agreement we cannot sell power cheaper in Port Edward than we can here.

Fred Shaw—We will no doubt have to let the grading of the streets and sewers stand until we finance this.

A. Cuthbert—If this company can make money selling power we can.

Ex-Ald. Douglas—I've always fought for this section. Most of my property is here.

Walter Shaw—You cannot mix antagonistic interests and get anywhere.

Ald. Tom Maitland—I've nothing to say only you know I'm against it.

DAILY TELEGRAPH COMMENTS UPON THE SITUATION PRODUCED.

Borrowings in Country Have Gone Up About Fifty Per Cent. This Year.


London, Dec. 11.—The Daily Telegraph in discussing the financial conditions respecting Canada's loans says the heavy borrowings are producing a steady decline in credit. It is declared that the Dominion finds it cheaper to borrow than to let necessary construction work lapse.

The Dominion's borrowings this year were thirty-five million dollars; those for the provinces fourteen millions; for the municipalities seventy-seven millions; for railways over a hundred and thirty-three millions, with miscellaneous borrowings of fifty millions. This makes a total of over three hundred and ten millions as compared with a total of two hundred and five millions last year.
