Last year the city electric plant burned \$23,000 worth of coal to produce 257 h. p. of energy. That amount of horse power at the Hydro-Electric Company's price of \$53 would have cost us \$13,621. In other words, if we turn down the agreement we will pay \$10,000 for the privilege of owning our own plant, to say nothing of the cost of distribution.
