INFERNAL MACHINE FOUND NEAR MINE

Deadly Device Filled With Nitroglycerin Picked Up by Officer in Strike Zone

Houghton, Mich., Jan. 28.—A suitcase found today by an under sheriff in underbrush near the power plant of the Ahmeek mine in Keweenaw county contained an infernal machine, according to reports received here tonight.

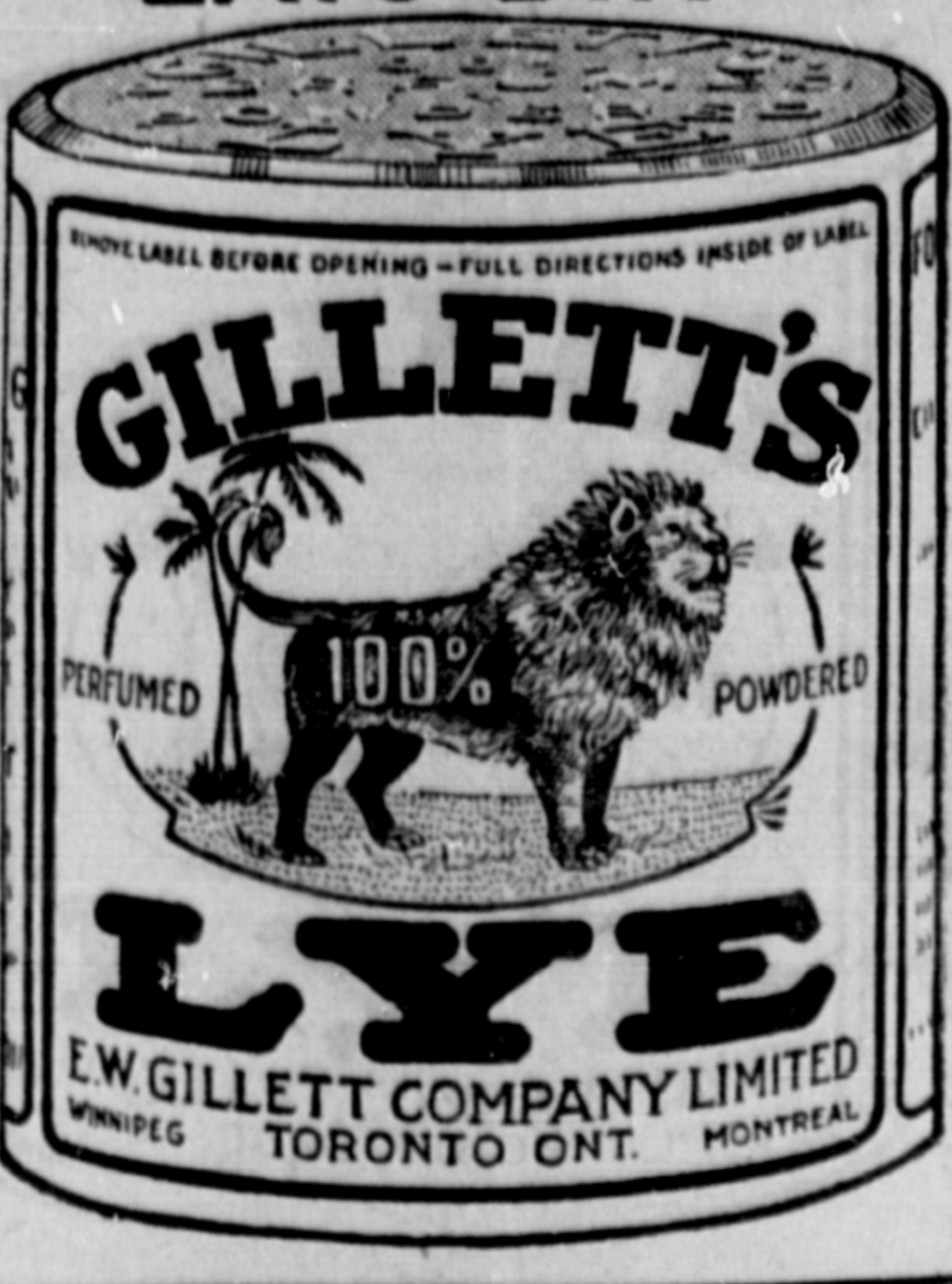
Attached to one end of a small board, according to the report, was a can partly filled with nitroglycerin. On the other end was fastened an alarm clock and dry battery connected by wires with the can. The clock was not running when the officer opened the case.

The Ahmeek mine is one of the so-called Calumet and Hecla subsidiaries. A large number of men have been imported recently to work in this mine, which is among those affected by the copper miners' strike.

WILL B. C. ANNEX YUKON TERRITORY

Extension of Boundary Part of Plan to Build Railway From Seattle to Alaska

Vancouver, January 28.—Sir Richard McBride and Hon. R. L. Borden, premier of Canada, have recently had some correspondence on the question of a proposal by the British Columbia premier to have this province take over the Yukon territory. The idea is that British Columbia should be extended north to the Arctic. The plan finds favor in Sir Richard's view in connection with his plan for the building of a great north-and-south railway from Seattle through British Columbia to the Yukon to connect with a line to traverse Alaska.

Smith, a young American, who bought the notorious English prison ship Success and brought it to this country after a journey of seventy-seven days, has made his fortune and will sell the vessel. Capt. Smith says he purchased the ship four years ago and since then made a fortune exceeding \$400,000. He says he has an offer of \$500,000 for the ship from a syndicate of show people in New York and he probably will accept the offer.

TRAMP LOSES LIFE SEEKING WARMTH

Found the Heating Plant of a Side Door Pullman Too Much for Him

Vancouver, Jan. 27.—One unfortunate member of the army who travel in side door Pullmans without buying tickets, paid with his life the penalty of securing warmth while travelling through the cold weather that now prevails in the mountain division of the C. P. R. According to advices received at the local C. P. R. divisional headquarters, the body of an unidentified man, who from all appearances was a tramp beating his way eastward, was found beside a charcoal heater in the heating compartment of a refrigerator car on an eastbound train. The discovery was made by one of the train crew who went into the compartment to replenish the fuel in the heater. The man had evidently gone in there to take advantage of the warmth which is maintained in the refrigerator cars carrying special shipments, and heaped on too much charcoal in the little heater. The fumes of the charcoal, making a deadly gas, in that confined space soon overcame him, probably while he slept, and life was extinct when the body was discovered.

The body was taken to Spence's Bridge, where an inquest will be held.
