

## A BIG SHIPMENT OF HIGH GRADE ORE AND FISH

### CITY TO DISPOSE OF TREASURY NOTES TO BANK--NEW PRESIDENT IN HAYTI RESTORES ORDER

#### SEVEN CARS SILVER LEAD ORE REPRESENTING OVER \$20,000

ALSO FOUR CARS FISH SHIPPED OUT OF PRINCE RUPERT  
YESTERDAY--NATURAL PRODUCTS OF DISTRICT SHOW  
DEVELOPMENT WITH TANGIBLE RETURNS

Prince Rupert is beginning to show returns for the faith the optimists have had in the city as a point for shipping natural products. Yesterday was a busy day in the waterfront with British Columbia products. At the G. T. P. the Prince Albert loaded seven cars of high grade silver lead ore from the Silver Standard mine at Hazelton. It was bound for the Trail smelter and represents something like \$3,000 a car, or over \$20,000 in the shipment. This is only the first of a continuous shipment which will be made while the sleighing holds in the mines. Teams will be hauling ore out for several weeks yet.

At the cold storage plant the Princess Beatrice took on four carloads of fish, representing another large sum of money which is directly returnable to Prince Rupert and the fishermen employed by the local company. There are great resources behind Rupert and the development of them is now assuming tangible returns. What the cold storage company, the Atlin Fisheries, the Silver Standard and the Harris mines of Hazelton are now doing will be duplicated shortly by many other companies. Prince Rupert will be shipping out carloads of natural products every day.

In Saturday's Daily News will be seen some statistics which show that Premier McBride has backed the notes of the C. N. R. to the extent of 59 millions. That means there is a mortgage of over \$100 a head on every man, woman and child in British Columbia for the Canadian Northern, brought to build up Vancouver.

Add to this the private mortgages, the municipal mortgages and the other provincial mortgages, and the British Columbia citizen is carrying a load that would stagger the average bank account.

Did Wm. Manson, M.P.P., who is one of the two obedient Tories who see nothing but good in the Bowser government, ever tell you about this 59 million?

Services Arranged Contemporary  
With Funeral Service at

On Thursday last a memorial service was held at Metlakatla in commemoration of the late Rev. Wm. Hogan. The service was arranged to take place at the same hour as the funeral at Masset. Rev. R. W. Gurd officiated. The church was effectively draped in black and the whole service was very appropriate.

Mr. Peter Venn gave a very appropriate address in which he extolled the life of the departed. He outlined the career of Mr. Hogan from the time he began his labors in Metlakatla in 1893. He also spoke of his great personality, his kindness and sympathy for the sick and sorrowing, and his uncompromising stand against all forms of sin. The service was closed by the Metlakatla band playing the Dead March in Saul.

#### GERMANY'S NAVAL RACE ECONOMIC NECESSITY

Reported That Refusal of Naval  
Holiday Is Because There Is  
No Other Work

London, Feb. 9.—The German admiral, von Tirpitz, makes an interesting confession that the refusal to entertain Hon. Winston Churchill's suggestion for a naval holiday was mainly due to industrial reasons. England, he says, is having much work from abroad and could cease building for the navy without demoralizing her labor conditions. The German yards on the other hand would be compelled to shut down during the holiday.

#### HON. W. PUGSLEY IN POOR HEALTH

Former Minister Public Works  
Will Probably be Absent  
from Parliament

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—It is said to be practically certain that Hon. William Pugsley, former minister of public works, will not be able to take his seat in parliament this session. The latest reports from St. John are to the effect that he has been ordered south for the winter and, in all probability, he will not return to Canada until toward the end of the session.

Mr. Pugsley had a serious illness subsequent to the protracted fight over the naval bill last session, when he practically led the opposition forces through the long all-night sessions. He became ill again last autumn with an attack of pleurisy, from the effects of which he has not recovered. The opposition members regret the absence of the former minister of public works, as he is probably their most resourceful fighter when things get into a tight corner.

The provincial dentists' combine have a bill before the legislature to amend the Dental Act in order to tighten up their monopoly. The bill is aimed directly at the advertising dentists of Vancouver and Victoria. The dental combine proposes to keep every dentist out of British Columbia until they have passed examinations which are prepared by representatives of the combine. The opponents of the bill want the privilege of articling experienced men, who will thus have an opportunity of paying their way while passing their examinations. They realize that British Columbia needs more dentists in the new districts being opened up. They also want the dental board under the control of the government instead of under the control of the combine. Wm. Manson is chairman of the special committee appointed to investigate the question.

#### TO SPEND MILLIONS FOR EQUIPMENT

G. T. P. Passenger Agent in Seattle  
Says Preponderance of  
Orders to United States

The Grand Trunk Pacific, which during the past year expended between \$40,000,000 and \$12,000,000 for rolling stock, will disburse almost an equal amount during the coming year, according to J. H. Burgis, general agent of the G. T. P. passenger department at Seattle.

"Probably five or six million of this will be spent on the western end of the line," said Mr. Burgis. The list of the rolling stock purchased last year shows a preponderance of the orders given to American houses, and the same policy is not unlikely to be followed this year. "This," said Mr. Burgis, "in addition to millions of dollars for steel and timber which was put in the new transcontinental line during the year 1913, purchased on the U. S. side of the line. These heavy purchases mean much to the prosperity of the steel and lumber industries.

The Grand Trunk system will purchase as much new equipment this year as in 1913."

#### Where It Rains Some

"Speaking of rain," remarked George Frizzell to The Daily News this morning, "the people of Prince Rupert don't know what rain is. When I was in Santa Barbara it rained eleven inches in twenty-four hours and kept it up to three or four days. There was three feet of water on the Southern Pacific grade. One man was drowned on the streets. It blew, too, for a short time and I never saw a wind up here like it. I saw lots of orange trees and baled hay floating away." Among Mr. Frizzell's experiences was being stalled on a railway train for thirty hours with nothing to eat.

#### New Church Bell

The handsome new bell purchased by Father Bunoz for St. Mary's Annunciation church was formally blessed at the evening services at the R. C. church last night. Father Bunoz officiated at the ceremony. The bell was suspended outside the chancel.

The new tower for the church will be completed this week and the bell will be hung in a few days. The bell was made in France and came by way of the Suez canal to Vancouver. It is inscribed with a gospel text and the name of the church, Father Bunoz, and the date. It is sweet-toned and will ring out true musical notes.

#### BANK OF MONTREAL TO TAKE TREASURY CERTIFICATES

BALANCE OF UNSOLD NOTES TO GO AT 96--WILL HAVE TO  
BE REPAID NEXT YEAR--PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT  
WILL GET THEIR FIRST

This morning word was received from the Bank of Montreal that they will undertake to dispose of the balance of the treasury notes and advance the city money in the meantime. The amount is for about \$371,000. It is understood the price was 96, less the stamp and discounting fees. As these notes are redeemable in 15 months the rate for this temporary loan will be nearly ten per cent.

Of this \$371,000, some \$125,000 has to be first paid to the provincial government, being the debt and accrued interest which has been standing for the past four years. The balance of the money will be utilized for hydro-electric development purposes. This money, along with the

rest of the treasury notes issued two years ago, has to be paid back next year. The council, however, anticipates that they will be able to sell enough of the fifty-year debentures before the close of the year to cover that amount.

Fred Dean, the representative of the Toledo bond brokers, was unable to make a deal with the finance committee. He offered 96 for any prospective four-year local improvement bonds and 85 for the ten-year Borden street school debentures. He would likely have accepted the twenty-year fives at 85 also but the finance committee refused to sell under 90.

Mr. Dean left last evening for the south.

#### VISIT OF ROYALTY DENIED WILL REJECT ARMY BUDGET

UNIONISTS DETERMINED TO SEND GOVERNMENT TO COUNTRY  
OVER HOME RULE--SUGGESTED THAT ESTIMATES  
BE REJECTED BY LORDS--FORCE DISSOLUTION

London, Feb. 9.—A statement is issued from Buckingham palace denying the report that the Prince of Wales, accompanied by Prince Albert and Sir John Anderson, would begin a tour of the overseas dominions in August.

Such a tour at present is entirely out of the question.

The reported latest Unionist device to dissolve parliament and defeat home rule is for the lords to reject the annual army budget bill. If this was done the army would cease to exist and the government would be compelled to appeal to the country.

#### JOHNSTON GETS BAIL FIXED AT \$2,000

Accused of Shooting Alfred  
Wright With Intent to  
Murder

August Johnston, section foreman on the G. T. P. at Mile 287, was brought down as a prisoner yesterday on a charge of shooting Alfred Wright with intent to kill. He was committed for trial by the Hazelton magistrate and will appear at the next assize court.

This morning Judge Young fixed his bail at \$2,000.

The story of the affair is a quarrel between Johnston and the Wright brothers. Alfred Wright worked on an adjoining section to that under the control of Johnston. Alfred quit his job and his brother tried to get him a job under Johnston. He did not succeed and took umbrage at the foreman.

One Sunday morning the two brothers approached Johnston's cabin and started to annoy him. They threatened to break in. Johnston got his gun and told John if he did not get away from the door he would shoot. John persisted and Johnston shot to one side of the door. The bullet went through a 12-inch log and then through both jaws of Alfred Wright, who was standing at one side.

Alfred Wright will get better.

#### Fire at Banff

Banff, Feb. 7.—A serious fire broke out this morning in the King Edward hotel. A number of smaller buildings were burned down owing to the freezing of the water in the mains. The whole town was threatened for a time, but the pipes thawed out and the situation was soon brought under control.

A. Pierson paid \$5 this morning for using obscene language on the streets.

#### HAYTI ELECTS NEW HEAD TRANQUILITY RESTORED

After Stormy Period of Threatened  
Revolution Peace Is  
Again Restored

After the election it was announced that detachments from foreign warships might return to their ships, since conditions were tranquil.
