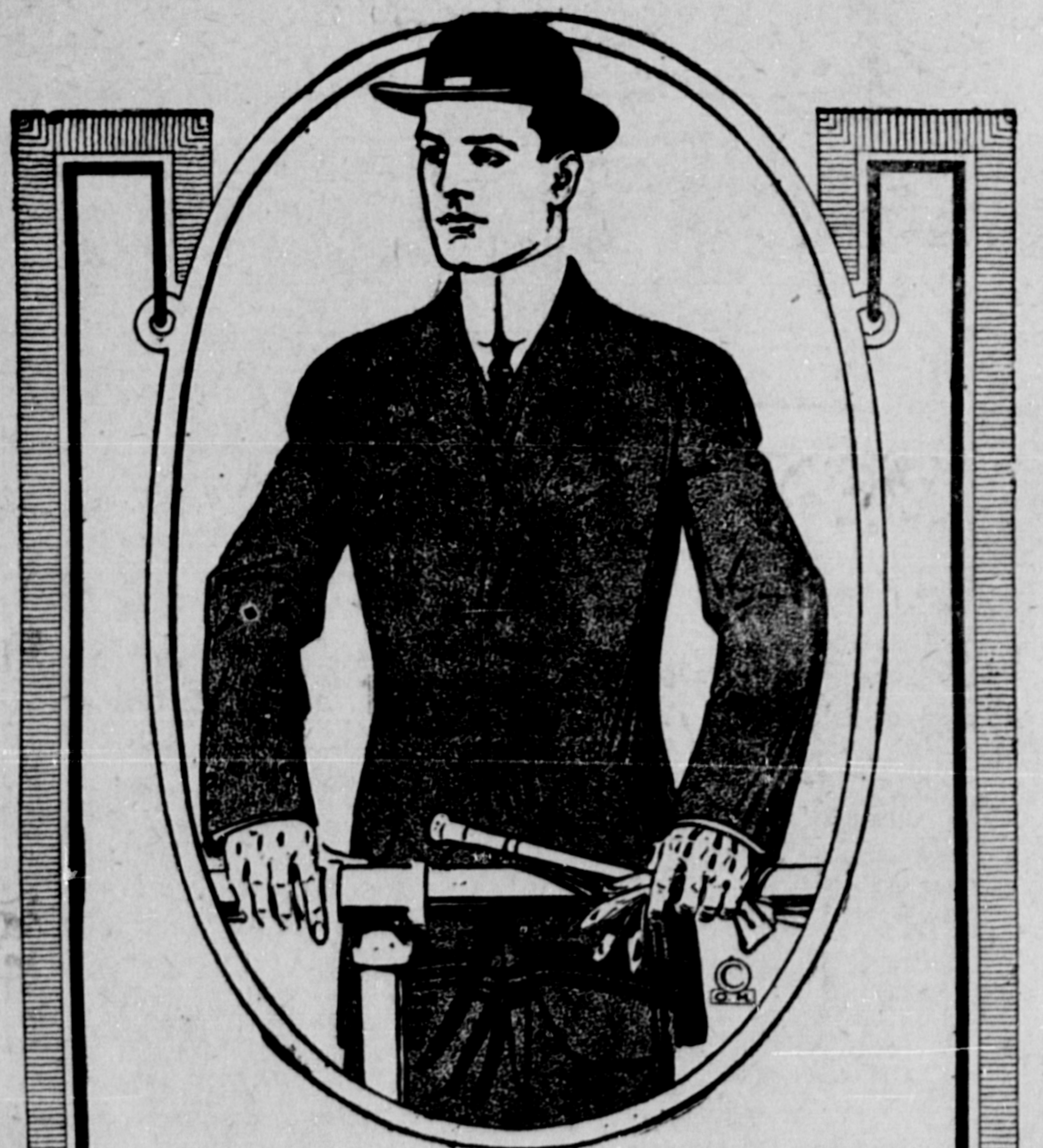

STEFANSSON THINKS KARLUK CREW SAFE

If Boat Is Crushed Men Could Get Ashore on Ice but Might Not Save Much

(Special to The Daily News) London, Feb. 20.—A despatch to the Daily Chronicle from Point Barrow says that Stefansson, the leader of the Arctic expedition, gives further details of the disappearance of the Karluk. Though he is far from sanguine that the Karluk will be saved, he has little doubt of the ultimate safety of the crew. If the vessel were crushed in the ice there would be little difficulty in the men getting to shore safely, but whether any material aboard the vessel could be saved depends on the distance and roughness of the ice.
