club of the International league, will go south to Marlin, Texas, with the Giants.

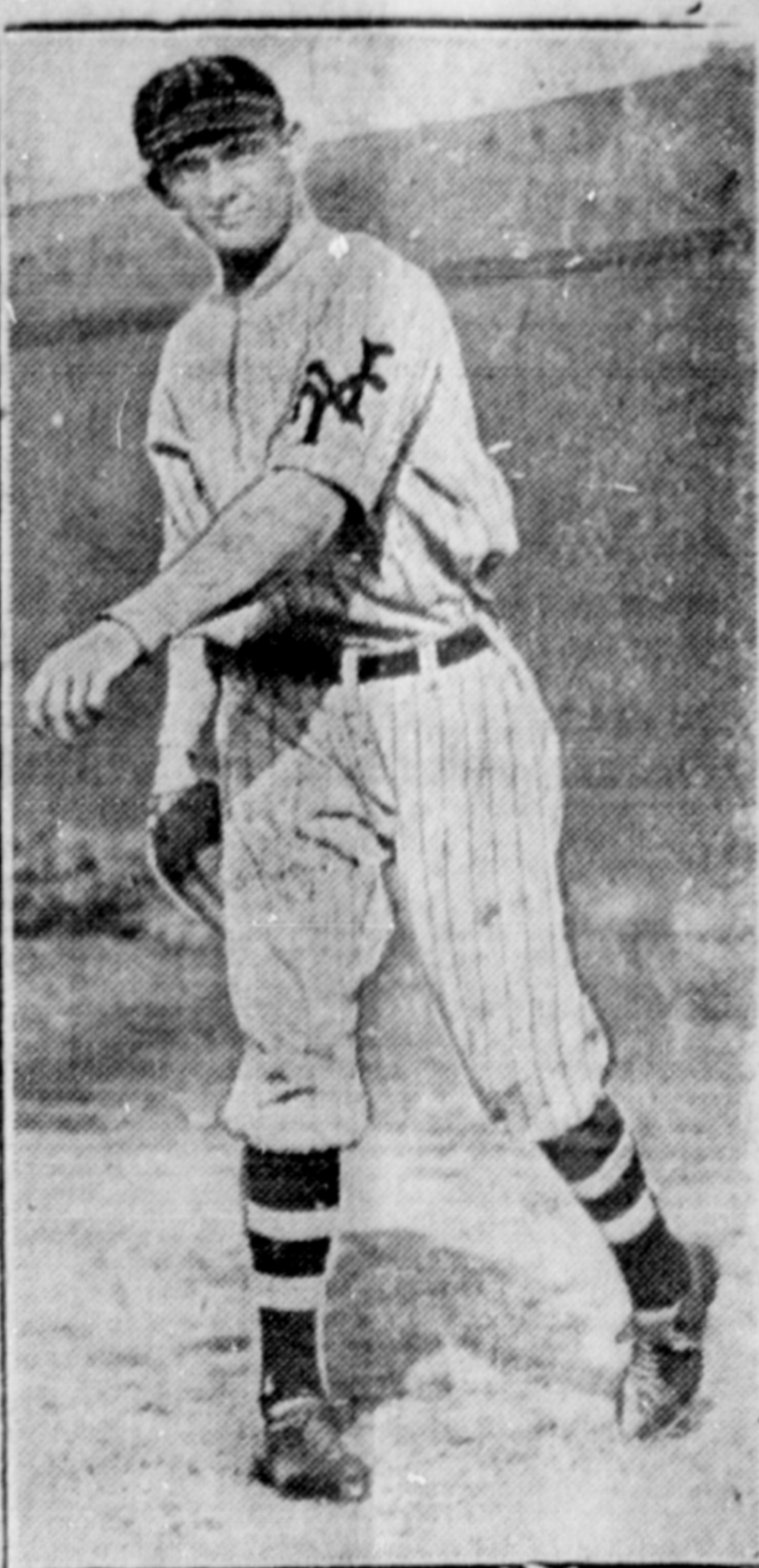

Bob Bescher, the outfielder secured from Cincinnati by the New York National league club in the winter's trade that sent Charley Herzog to the Ohio city to manage the Reds, signed his contract on Saturday. Bescher had been a holdout for an increase in salary.

Rube Waddell, the great left-hander who in his day was one of the best mountsmen that ever worked in the major league, will never pitch another ball. The admission comes from the great Rube himself, who has returned his unsigned contract to Kid Taylor of Superior, who is manager of the Virginia club in the Northern league. Waddell came to Virginia last season from Minneapolis.

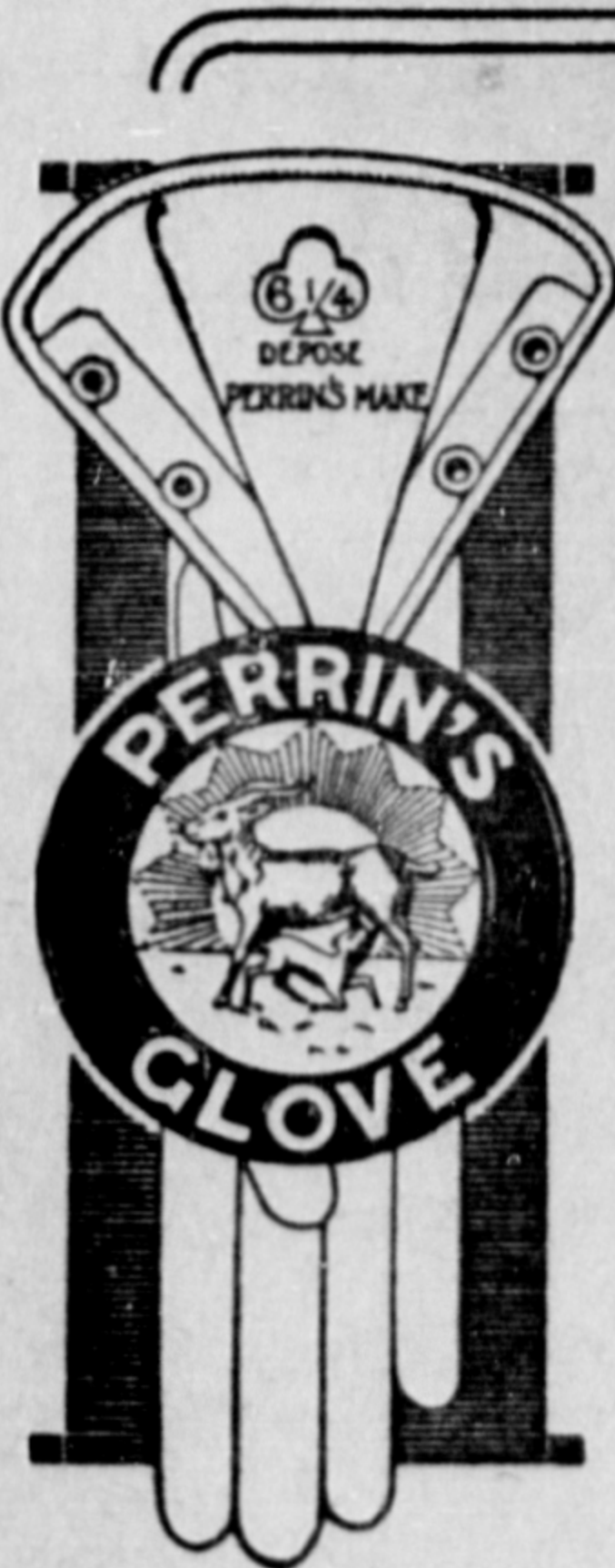
