FIRST CASE OF ITS KIND IN CANADA

Jury awards verdict of five hundred dollars damages against Ontario farmer who married a second time when his first wife was living. Miss Maria Fisher and Henry Jones, pictured above, were the principals in a peculiar case at the Toronto assizes. Jones, who is a prosperous farmer, was married 26 years ago, but according to his own statements had not seen her for 26 years and had received an anonymous telegram that she was dead. In February, 1912, Miss Fisher answered Jones' advertisement for a housekeeper, and after a short courtship, they went through a form of marriage and lived together for nearly a year. Then the first wife turned up and Jones was arrested for bigamy, but acquitted by a jury. Miss Fisher sued for \$10,000 damages for loss of character and social standing, and was given five hundred dollars. The presiding judge said it was the first case of its kind in Canada.
