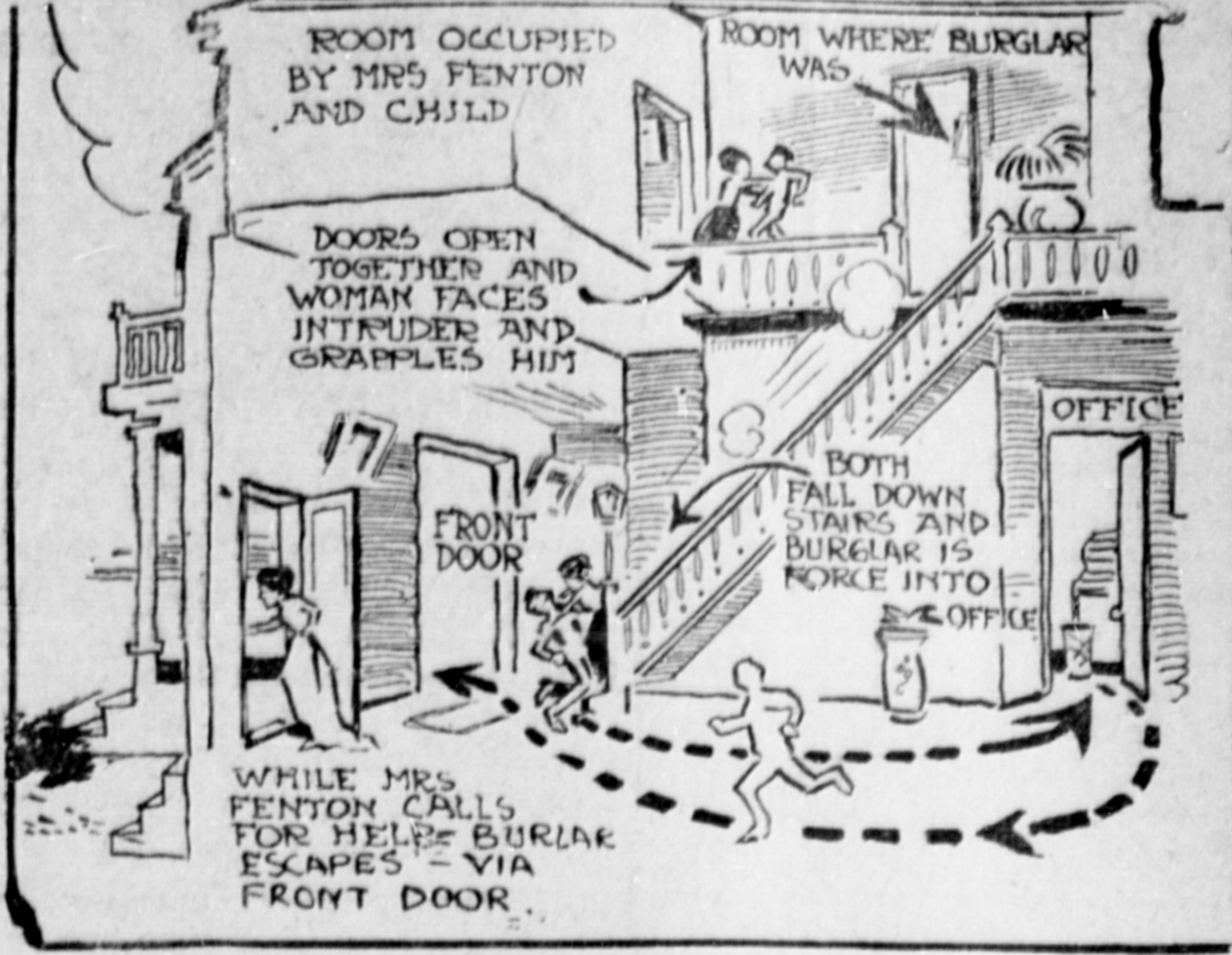

Fatal to Thirty Labrador Eskimos in One Week, Says Dr. Grenfell

London, March 2.—Dr. Wilfrid Grenfell lectured in Queen's Hall last night on Labrador, to whose people he has devoted his life.

Dr. Grenfell said that at one remote spot a man who was perfectly well came to his ship to be treated lest he fall ill before Grenfell, the only physician, got around again in six months.

The 250 reindeer Dr. Grenfell introduced have increased fourfold and make it possible for the Eskimos to live in the interior of the peninsula.

White men have introduced the grippe, which was fatal to thirty Eskimos in a week.
