The Spokeshoot, belonging to Messrs. Enrig, Adams & Co., came in from Essington this morning. She brought a large number of passengers.

Mr. J. G. McNab, who has been attending a conference of C. P. R. passenger agents in Vancouver, returned on the Princess Maquinna yesterday.

Mr. M. Scaife, who has been in the south for six months, returned on the Prince Albert. He hasn't seen anything that looks so good as Prince Rupert in the course of his travels.

Mrs. R. G. Johnson, wife of the manager of Inverness cannery, has returned from the south. She was attending the funeral of her father, Mr. Stapleton.

Mr. Howell of Inverness left on the Princess Maquinna yesterday for Ketchikan. He will be away for about a month.

Good progress is being made with the piling at the Westholme dock. Mark Hyatt has the work in charge and it is intended to extend the wharf forty feet east.

Sam Johnson, one of the old residents of Prince Rupert, who has been visiting in Dalfors, Sweden, has written to a friend here that he expects to return about April 1st.

There is a big force of men working at Balmoral cannery repairing the roof which was caved in by the heavy snowfall in the winter. Mr. Dickenson, the manager, expects to have things shipshape in a few days.

Chief Engineer McRae arrived a few days ago to take up his duties on the government boat Cygnet. Mr. McRae was chief on the Venture when she was burnt down three years ago.

H. Johnson was out on Saturday looking for a natural crook for the stem of Sam Johnson and A. Swanson's new towboat. He found a dandy. This boat will be one of the stoutest ever built on the coast, having ribs four inches by three, very closely spaced. When the 90-horsepower engine is installed she will be able to handle anything.

The government snag scow Cygnet, which has been on the ways at Digby island since November, went into commission again yesterday. She will be kept busy removing obstacles to navigation in the Skeena. Captain Hoppenslaw, who was in command last year, has taken a position with the Rudge cannery, and has been succeeded by Captain Holme.
