Navigators Go to School

Something new in schools is that now being conducted at Owen Sound, Ont., by the Canada Steamship Lines, Limited. It is for the benefit of their own men—a course in higher navigation. Last month the school opened in Toronto, and after a few weeks' session at Owen Sound, it will be moved to Midland.

Captain Geo. D. Frewer, official compass adjuster of the company's fleet of 101 boats, is the instructor. To him come the captains, first mates, second mates and wheelmen in the employ of the Canada Steamship lines. The course of instruction is, in effect, a post-graduate one; the examinations set by the Canada Steamship lines being 50 per cent higher than the government standard. This results in a high degree of efficiency on the part of the company's officers. As instancing the thoroughness of the instruction, it is interesting to learn that it includes a course in the handling of package freight.
