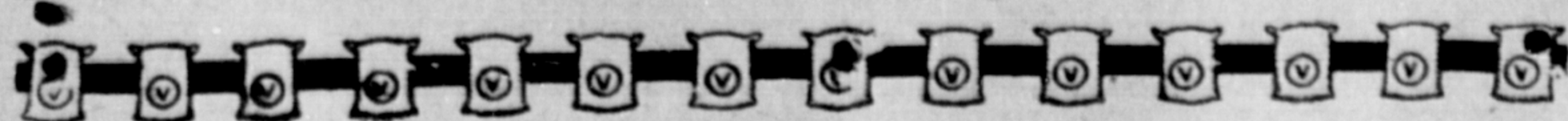

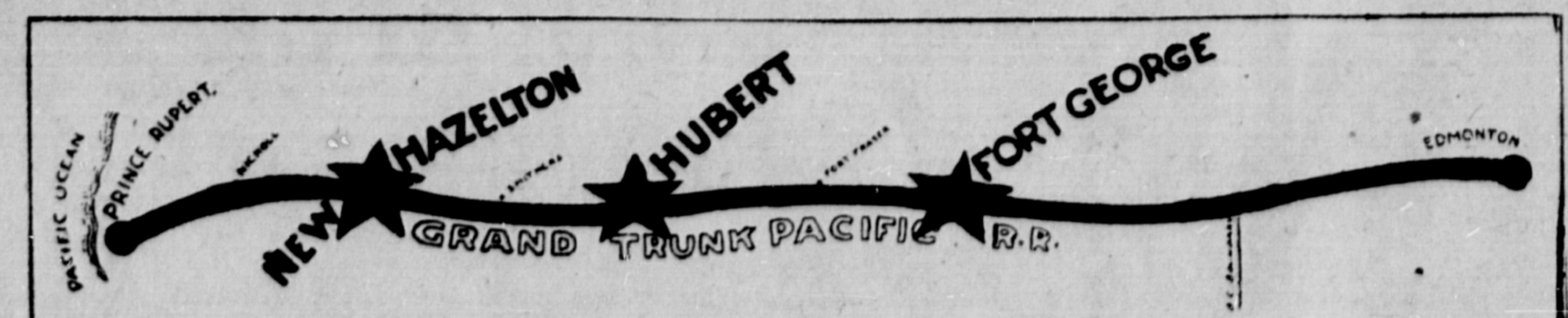

Presbyterian Literary Society

There was a big meeting in the Presbyterian hall last night to hear Ald. McClymont deliver a paper on "Socialism." Ald. McClymont gave a short sketch of the history of socialism and also pointed out what it stood for. He stated that under socialism healthy competition would be done away with, and all incentive to better one's self socially would be effaced. He quoted from such well known socialist writers as R. R. Blatchford, H. G. Wells and Herr Bebel to show that even those great minds could not conceive what a socialistic state would really mean. Ald. McClymont, therefore, contended that the socialistic theory was to destroy existing institutions without making provision to give us something better in return. He stated that under socialism home life would be destroyed and all children would require to be handed over to the care of the state. Ald. McClymont's paper brought forth a storm of criticism.

Those speaking in favor of socialism pointed out the social evils which prevailed at the present day and how capitalists sucked the life blood out of the working man in order that the capitalist class might have all the pleasures and good things of this life. Under socialism, they contended, such a state of affairs would be impossible as everybody would require to be a producer. They stated that the only way out was for the working man to take over all the means of production and keep them to themselves, that is, social tools to be socially owned. Under these conditions there would be no drones in the hive. All the speakers spoke strongly in regard to the breaking up of the home under socialism, and were firmly convinced that this was a fallacy.

Those speaking in favor of socialism were Messrs. King, Moore, Hunter, Montgomery, Casey and Mayr.

Mr. H. F. McRae, while admiring the socialistic theory, failed to see that it could be practically applied with human nature as it is, but human nature was changing every day, and perhaps in the distant future a modified form of socialism might come into effect.

The chairman announced that next Wednesday would be devoted to impromptu speeches on a variety of topics.

Last night's football game between the steamship Prince Rupert's team and a team picked from members of the Callies, resulted in a win for the latter by five goals to one. The defence of the Rupert boys is strong, but the forward line will require to develop combination before they can expect to rival the Callies. G. S. Russell handled the game in a capable manner.

land at or near Dodge Cove, 600 feet wide and extending inland 200 feet more or less from high water mark, to be used by the Department of Public Works in connection with the storage of shipyard material. The actual site of the said property to be selected by the Public Works District engineer and to be satisfactory to the company.

That the company undertakes that in all its leases of lands, foreshore and water lots to industrial concerns, at and around Seal Cove (in water front Blk. I.) the annual rental to be charged and collected by the company (the lessee paying all taxes, water rates and other assessments) not to exceed 6 per cent. of the assessed valuation.

That a quit claim of the foreshore and bed of the public harbor of Prince Rupert in front of water front blocks A, C, E, F, G, and I out to the harbor line as established by order in council of the 25th January, 1913, and each correction in description herein as may hereafter be necessary, do issue to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company upon payment of the sum of \$1 such grant to be subject to the conditions submitted by the company as set forth above.
