I. E. Mahon of the Canadian Bridge Co., who is in charge of the building of the steel bridges along the line, has returned from a trip to Seattle.

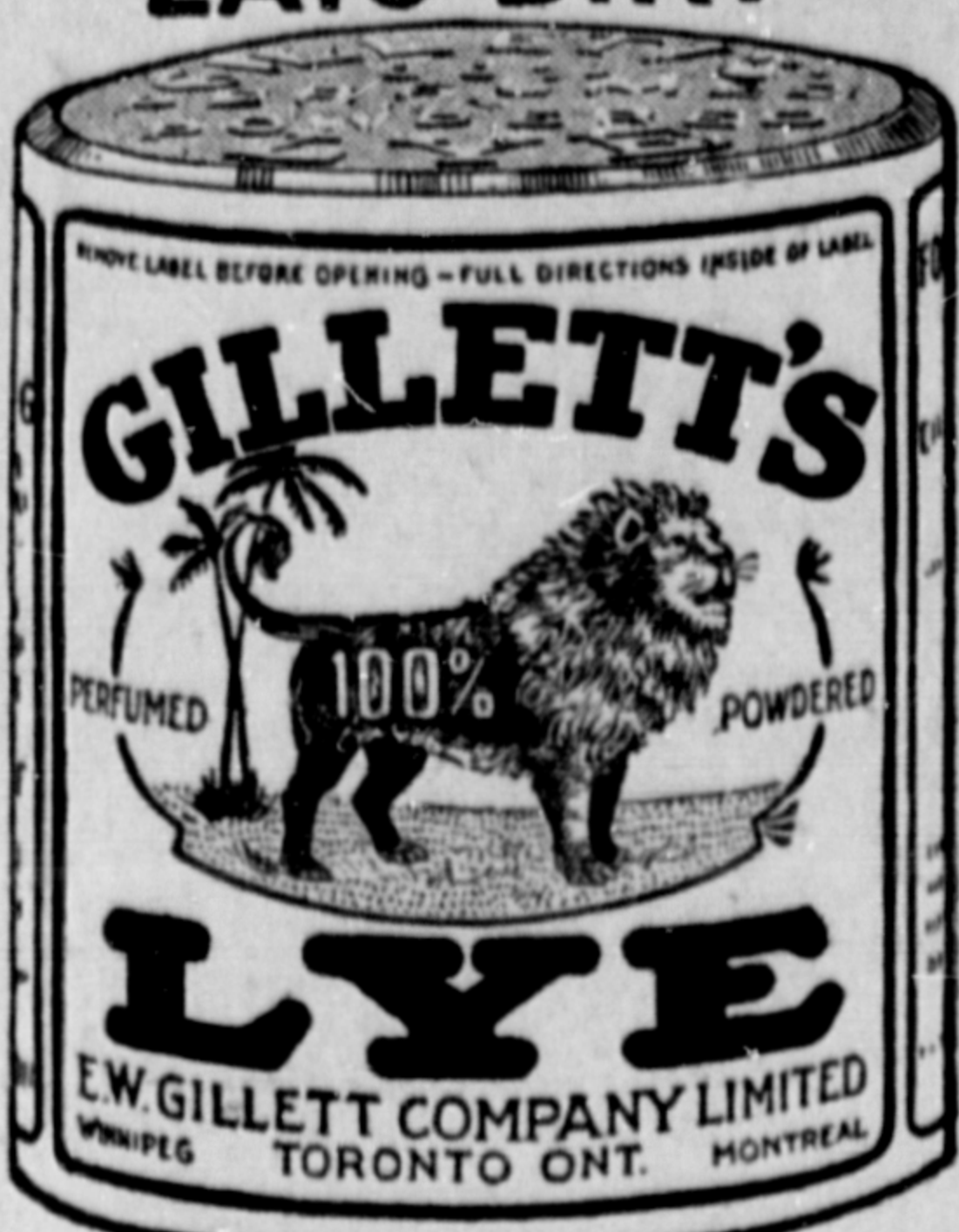

Some of the apologists for the local Tory machine in making excuses for the disbanding of Earl Grey's Rifles claim it was because Capt. Fred Stork a year ago sent a telegram to Mr. Pardee urging him to keep up the fight against the Naval bill. The attention of the machine is drawn to the comment of Colonel Sam Hughes in the house of commons to the criticism against Capt. Tom Wallace, who sent a message to Sir Edward Carson saying that thousands of loyal Canadians were with him in the Ulster fight. The minister of militia said:

"The alleged cablegram does not in any way relate to the duties of Mr. Wallace as an officer on the reserve, and the minister is not called upon to express any opinion with regard thereto. Any attempt to discipline Capt. Wallace in the case suggested would be not only improper but illegal."

Therefore, according to the minister himself, the disciplining of Capt. Fred Stork for sending a telegram to a political conferee would be "improper and illegal."

Liquor Barred in U. S. Navy
Washington, April 9.—Secretary Daniels' order barring the use of alcoholic liquors in the navy, effective after July 1 next, was generally discussed today in naval and other circles. The order, one of the most sweeping ever promulgated by the navy department, not only abolished the traditional "wine mess" of the officers, but will bar all alcoholic liquors from every ship and shore station of the navy. Surgeon General Braisted recommended it after an exhaustive investigation into the problem.

The G. T. P. officials decided they could not allow the citizens to pay for the use of the automobiles in showing the visitors around the city as they were not formal guests of the city. The thoughtfulness of Mr. Hart and the citizens in arranging for the autos is, however, very much appreciated. Mr. Hart, after deducting the few minor expenses of the reception, will return the money collected.
