The above picture shows where the bodies of Sandersky and Cohen were taken from the ruins of the wall of the Independent Cloak company, the ruins of which, after being gutted by fire last January, were left standing. By instructions from the city architect, Albert Strong, an expert wrecker was given the job of demolishing the building, shortly after the fire. When the building was in a safe condition, it was turned over to Weinerman, owner of the building, and also a wrecker. He discharged Strong and employed a number of foreigners. The men were poorly paid and absolutely ignorant of their work, and this is held responsible for the collapse. Two killed and five or six injured is the toll of the disaster.
