UNITED STATES AND MEXICO AGREE TO ARMISTICE

COLORADO MINE STRIKERS WAR HAS CEASED—HAZELTON DISTRICT WILL BE BIG MINING CAMP

HAKE FREIGHTER IS WRECKED CREW OF 19 LOST WITH HER

LIFE SAVERS ABANDONED SEARCH AFTER DISCOVERING THE PILOT HOUSE ON BEACH—STRUCK IN STORM

Duluth, April 30.—All hope at the freighter Benjamin Noble is still afloat and the 19 men aboard are safe was abandoned by life savers after finding the pilot house of the Noble on beach. In addition to high seas, fog and snow, the Duluth light went out about the time the Noble should have entered through and she struck the point and foundered.

Duluth, April 29.—The steamship Benjamin Noble has been

lost. Twenty men have perished. The life saving crew found that they were unable to launch a boat in the high seas. No one reached shore, so far as known, from the vessel.

Anxiety is felt for five other vessels headed for this port. All were overdue yesterday. These are the Wm. H. Trusdale, Willis King, F. T. Heffelfinger, Sheldon Parks and the David Z. Norton. No word has been received of the vessels. Diligent search by wireless continued throughout the night and this morning.

HAZELTON WILL BE BIGGEST CAMP IN B.C.

Prediction of Prominent Mining Man Who Is Visiting in City

E. H. Wilson, a well known mining man of San Francisco, is in the city for a few days on a tour of gathering mining information. Mr. Wilson has been gathering big silver and gold properties in Mexico and was expected to leave owing to the war. He is now spending his time looking over the mining districts of British Columbia.

Mr. Wilson visited New Hazelton a year ago, but has not been there yet this time. He has great faith in the New Hazelton district and believes it will be the biggest mining camp in British Columbia. Mr. Wilson is a practical mining man and knows the mine in all its phases. He has interests in Hazelton, so that his opinion is free from prejudice.

Interceded for Foreigners

Vera Cruz, April 29.—Commander Tweedie of the British cruiser Essex went to Mexico City several days ago without ostentation to intercede for the foreigners held at the capital. He has returned and has reported that his mission was successful. President Huerta, General Blanquet, the war minister, and M. Rojas, another of his advisers, assured the commander that they would release all the American prisoners. The assurance was given that these might leave by way of Puerto, Mexico, but that no escorts would be provided.

Accident at Wharf

A rather serious accident happened today at the coal pier. A tub of coal was being hoisted and tipped by striking the wharf. A man by the name of Beers was standing near and the falling coal struck him in the face. A taxi took him immediately to the hospital, where he was attended to. The injuries are not serious and he will soon recover.

G. T. P. Manager Resigns

Winnipeg, April 29.—F. W. Bergman, general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific and Grand Trunk hotels, tendered his resignation to the corporation early last week, to take effect on May 1. The resignation, however, has gone into immediate effect, as last Friday Mr. Bergman's furniture and effects were removed from the Fort Garry hotel and shipped east, while Mr. Bergman himself has journeyed in the same direction.

HALIFAX BOXER WON AMATEUR HONORS

MORE CONTRACTS FOR WORK ON P. G. E. R.

Location Surveyors Are Out North of Fort George

Vancouver, April 28.—Returning to Vancouver from Fort George and points along the route of the Pacific Great Eastern, A. E. Griffin, general superintendent of P. G. E. R., general contractor, states that sub-contracts will be let within a few days for the construction of sections between Clinton and Fort George.

He declares that the work along the line is progressing very favorably, and that it will most certainly be completed on time in the early part of next year. When he left Fort George the location surveyors for the Peace River extension north of that town had not come in. He was consequently unable to say just what work they had done.

The sections which will be let to sub-contractors shortly are about the last to be distributed by Pat Welch. About 200 miles of grade and track between Clinton and Fort George comprise the work that has as yet to be undertaken. Long before that work is completed a start will be made on the construction of the line around Howe sound. It is stated that this Howe sound section will be constructed by the general contractor. No sub-contracts will be let on that section, according to present intentions. This part of the work will be some of the most difficult railway construction on the coast.

In places the line runs along the face of cliffs and precipitous mountains. It will literally have to be blasted out of solid rock. Nine or ten tunnels will have to be bored.

Discussing conditions in the north, Mr. Griffin said that the linking up of the Grand Trunk Pacific was resulting in a great rush to the new country. Settlers are pouring into the territory opened up by the new line. They are going in by way of Edmonton principally.

Contract for Apartment

The contracts for the Mc-Mordie apartment house to be erected at the corner of Third avenue and Eighth street were let yesterday and building is to start immediately. Mitchell & Curry have the contract for the carpentry and lumber; the plumbing was awarded to the Western Plumbing Co., the roofing to Steen & Herbert; the wiring went to Brown, and the plastering was given to Martin McGowan.

Post Holes Will Be \$2.50

At a meeting of the board of works of the city council it was decided to fix the price for digging the post holes for the power line at \$2.50 each. The city engineer was then authorized to give the work out to station gangs at that price. There are about 140 holes to dig yet to finish the line.

POTATOES FROM U.S. MUST PAY FULL DUTY

Motion to Remove Duty Defeated by Ottawa Government

Ottawa, April 30.—The House of Commons last night defeated the motion of Loggie to remove the duty on potatoes from the United States by a vote of 66 to 33.

ONLY EIGHT BODIES SO FAR RECOVERED

Work of Rescue in Mine Disaster Is Proceeding Very Slowly

Eccles, W. Va., April 29.—Eight blackened bodies have been recovered from No. 6 shaft of the New River colliery, which was wrecked by an explosion. There are no more men in No. 6. There are 176 men buried in the No. 5 shaft. The officers of the company have expressed the opinion that there will be no escape for them. The rescue party got within 129 feet of the bottom of the passage, when they were stopped by heavy timbers. There was a heavy fill of earth there.

ATTACKED BY PAPER PULLED SENATOR'S NOSE

How a Tory Got Even With the Editor of a Nova Scotia Newspaper

Halifax, N. S., April 29.—A picturesque old English custom was revived in the legislative building when R. H. Butts, Conservative member for Cape Breton, publicly pulled Senator Dennis' nose in retaliation for a personal attack Senator Dennis' paper, the Evening Mail, made on him. The incident occurred just prior to the opening of the session of the special investigating committee into certain charges made in the Mail, which have been held to be a breach of the privileges of the house.

At a recent session Mr. Butts took occasion to refer to Senator Dennis' action on accepting responsibility for this publication as cowardly, claiming that the owner of the Mail was shielding himself behind his parliamentary position. The Evening Mail continued rather personal in reference to the attack, and when Senator Dennis entered the chamber Mr. Butts arose from his place at the table, and, grabbing the senator's nose between his fingers, tweaked it somewhat vigorously. The incident created a little stir. Friends rushed to the senator's assistance and Mr. Butts quietly resumed his seat.

LOCAL INDUSTRY IS GETTING UNDER WAY

Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Christian of the Port Edward shingle mills are in town and report splendid progress in the construction of the plant. The main building, about 40x60, is almost completed and machinery to turn out 60,000 feet per day has arrived. The output, too, can be increased if desired.

Mr. Christian is installing a 100-h. p. Pelton wheel which will be operated by the water power which even now furnishes electric power to the town. He expects to have everything in operation in the next few weeks, and there should be a ready market for their products.

ARMISTICE WAS ARRANGED BY SPANISH AMERICAN NATIONS

CARRANZA HAS AGREED TO PLANS OF MEDIATION — NEGOTIATIONS FOR PEACE ARE NOW UNDER CONSIDERATION

Washington, April 30.—The scope of the mediation plans have broadened into a formal compliance by Carranza. The principals in the mediation are

Brazil, Chile and Argentine representatives. Earlier in the day the mediators asked for an armistice pending the outcome of negotiations. This is likely to be accepted by the United States.

COLORADO WAR HAS ENDED STRIKERS DECLARE A TRUCE

SEVERAL KILLED AND WOUNDED—OFFICER OF HOSPITAL CORPS AMONG KILLED—STRIKERS SURRENDER ARMS

Denver, April 30.—The toll of the Colorado strike riots is nine dead and three wounded. Eight more were killed at Forbes. An officer of the militia hospital

corps was killed at Wattenburg while attending to wounded men. Two of the enlisted men were wounded.

A truce has been declared and 650 strikers have agreed to surrender their arms to the militia.

COMPROMISE ON HOME RULE AGAIN UNDER CONSIDERATION

London, April 30.—A compromise on home rule seems to be nearer today than ever. There exists a strong belief in parliamentary circles that conferences between the leaders of the two great parties will shortly be resumed. Austen Chamberlain's motion for a judicial enquiry into the government's "plot" was

defeated by 344 to 264. Sir Edward Carson has accepted Hon. Winston Churchill's overtures.
