U.S. PEACE MEDIATORS WOULD BE RID OF HUERTA

UNIONIST WON BY-ELECTION, LIBERAL MADE BIG GAIN -- WAIT FOR ASQUITH'S AMENDMENT

BY-ELECTION IN BRITAIN LIBERALS GAINING GROUND

PLACE OF LATE SIR GEORGE DOUGHTY FILLED -- 1,556 ADDITIONAL VOTES CAST BUT UNIONIST MAJORITY DECIDEDLY REDUCED

London, May 13.—A by-election to fill the place of the late George Doughty took place at Grimsby yesterday. The result of the ballot is that F. G. Tickler, Unionist, got 8,871 votes and A. Bannister, Liberal, 8,193. The vote cast was 1,556 larger than last election and the Unionist majority was decreased by 129.

SOUTH AMERICAN ENVOYS SEEK ELIMINATION HUERTA

ALL ENDEAVOR TO SETTLE THE WHOLE MEXICAN PROBLEM—UNITED STATES VICE-CONSUL TO BE RELEASED AND SENT HOME UNDER GUARD

MEXICAN DIPLOMATS HAVE FULL AUTHORITY

United States Mediators Chosen -- Party Leaves for Niagara Falls

Washington, May 13.—Associate Justice Joseph Rucker Lamar of the United States supreme court, and Frederick W. Lehmann of St. Louis, former solicitor-general, have been selected by the president to represent his views before the South American mediators in the Mexican mediation negotiations at Niagara Falls, Canada. Secretary Bryan has made this official announcement. Whether a third representative would be appointed, Mr. Bryan declined to indicate, stating that it could be assumed that there would be no other.

Vera Cruz, May 12.—Emilio Rabasa, Augustin Rodriguez and Louis Elguero, the three peace commissioners appointed by President Huerta to represent him at the Niagara Falls conference, will sail late today for Havana en route to Key West, are clothed with full powers, nominally at least, to sign any agreement or convention. The Mexican senate in a resolution approving President Huerta's nomination of the three commissioners, "conferred full power and ample authority to judge, counsel, carry on business and sign any agreement or treaty whatever."

JEALOUS HUSBAND MURDERED HIS WIFE

Cut Her Throat and Then Made Attempt to End His Own Life

Victoria, May 12.—One of the most gruesome murders ever committed in Victoria occurred here today. Archie Young murdered his wife in bed, slitting her throat from ear to ear.

Following this, the man attempted suicide with the same weapon, but did not carry out his plans. He now lies in St. Joseph's hospital in a dying condition.

Jealousy, it is believed, was at the bottom of the tragedy.

Kestrel a Freighter

San Francisco, May 13.—News of the crew of the French barque La Tour de Vergune, wrecked last year on Lord Palmerston's isle in the South seas, was brought here yesterday by the British barque Antiope.

The Antiope, tacking into the island last November, to view the wreck, discovered the marooned mariners, but was unable to take them off owing to the lack of provisions aboard. Several of the shipwrecked men had married native women and were content to remain.

When the Antiope reached Newcastle, it reported the wreck and a French cruiser was sent to the relief of the crew.

Both men will leave Vancouver tomorrow, arriving here Saturday to complete their training at the Windsor hotel.

Contracts for the construction of forty miles of the Pacific Great Eastern railway were announced Saturday by officials of that company. Only about 125 miles of the railway have yet been let to contractors.

Four contractors received the contracts announced. These are Moran & Heckman, who will build a section of about ten miles between Kelly lake and Clinton; Welsh & Kennedy, four miles more north of Moran & Heckman; Rankin & Kellet, twenty miles north of that contract again, and Madden Brothers, who will build the next stretch of six miles.

Mr. A. E. Griffin, superintendent for Pat Welsh, the general contractor, has instructed these sub-contractors that they must start their work immediately. Other contracts recently let have already been started.
