REDISTRIBUTION BILL IS ALMOST READY FOR HOUSE

GENERAL M. P. MOVES SIX MONTHS' HOIST TO C. N. R. BILL—VOTE WILL BE TAKEN IN FEW DAYS

Ottawa, May 15.—E. M. MacDonald of Pictou moved that the redistribution bill be considered six months hence. The vote on Mr. MacDonald's motion will be taken next Tuesday. It was hoped at the last meeting of the redistribution committee to settle the details of the changes in ridings when they meet Monday. The difficulties which arose chiefly over Ontario are about cleared up and it is expected that an early settlement will be arrived at.

THREE LIVES FOR ONE ORDER MEXICAN BANDIT

Quevedo to Have His Revenge on Americans

Juarez, May 15.—Three American lives are the price that will be collected by General Rodolfo Quevedo for every bandit in his command killed by Constitutional soldiers, according to a defi from Quevedo today. Quevedo said he would kill Americans at the ratio of three to one for his own losses in revenge for the action of the big Northern Chihuahua Cattle Company, owned by Americans, which had demanded protection of the Constitutionalists. As a result of that representation a force of constitutionalist cavalry was sent out from Juarez, which has been in pursuit of the bandits and has killed several of them in a running fight.

PRINCE RUPERT IS A GREAT HALIBUT PORT

Half a Million Pounds Received Yesterday and Today--Fishermen Make Money--Merchants Sell Supplies

That Prince Rupert is destined to be the great fish port of the Pacific is growing more apparent every day. Fresh halibut is coming in at the rate of \$5,000 to \$10,000 worth daily, and that means money for the fishermen and business for the merchants.

Yesterday The News reported the arrival of 300,000 pounds of halibut, which at the prevailing price is worth \$10,000. Of this amount over \$3,000 is handed

out to the fishermen. Independent fishermen who brought in over 40,000 pounds got 34c per pound for their catch.

Today the Foster of the Gold Storage Co. fleet arrived with 160,000 pounds, being out on a very short trip.

At one of the fishing docks yesterday The News man overheard some orders for supplies being phoned to local merchants. "That makes \$600 worth of

orders we have sent in today," said the office man.

There are now some thirty independent fishing boats fishing out of Prince Rupert. This in the next few years with a good fishing policy should be raised to thousands, and at this season of the year there should be a trainload of fish going out daily.

Several other boats of the local company's fleet are expected in tonight or tomorrow.

Big U. S. Naval Bill

Washington, May 15.—The Naval Appropriation Bill was reported to the Senate today by the naval affairs committee with an increase of \$1,182,000 over the bill as it left the house. In all, the bill carries \$140,990,833 or \$3,500,000 less than the estimates for the coming year.

Exemption from tolls on battleships of all nations passing through the Panama Canal on the occasion of the celebration of its opening is provided in the bill.

Horse Troughs Eliminated

Philadelphia, May 15th.—Following its ban on the common drinking cup for human beings the board of health here today forbid the use of common drinking troughs for animals. The State Livestock Board declared the glanders and other diseases were being spread by the common troughs.

New Westminster, May 15.—Clark and Davis were executed in the courtyard of the provincial jail this morning, paying the penalty of the law for the murder of Constable Archibald in Vancouver. No confession was made by either of the men.

OIL GUSHER NEAR CALGARY CITY JUBILANT OVER STRIKE

ESTIMATED TO FLOW 200 BARRELS EVERY TWENTY-FOUR HOURS—ALSO LARGE FLOW OF NATURAL GAS

Calgary, May 15.—This city is jubilant over the strike in an oil well near Calgary by the Petroleum Products Co. The president of the Calgary Industrial bureau credits that it will produce from 150 to 200 barrels each 24 hours. The oil on analysis shows 62 beam gravity. In addition to oil, the gas output is estimated at two million cubic feet.

One body was blown through a building. Three others were burned beyond recognition. It is believed that gasoline was the cause of the explosion.
