Now, Mr. Editor, how about the single man who had faith enough to invest his little savings when there was no mayor or aldermen here and has faithfully paid his taxes and improvements since? Now that money is hard to get, he turns to the city that he helped to create and asks for a day's work in a sewer or on a rock pile, and is told that only married men need apply—perhaps just arrived from Vancouver or Seattle; no restrictions have been made. A short time ago we were asked to kill the Hydro-Electric company getting a franchise. Those who did find they have closed the only avenue whereby they might escape from the penalty of unemployment as far as the city is concerned, and if the opportunity offers (and I feel confident that it will) I should advise all

workingmen in Prince Rupert to support the Prince Rupert Hydro Electric company in their endeavor to obtain a franchise here, even though we do pay a little more for our light. In doing so we will be supporting a good, progressive company who have always paid the highest wages and have always treated their employees generously, as many men in Prince Rupert know who have worked for them in their camps at Slave Falls or Port Edward. A visit to their camps will bear out my statements that the Hydro-Electric is no cheap outfit. We will then have an opportunity of obtaining employment on our merits and doing business with a real progressive company, whether married or single. Think it over.

NEW SCALE OF WAGES TO BE VOTED ON BY LONGSHOREMEN'S UNION

tute a sling load, and in the event of smaller cases of these commodities being handled, that the loads be made (15) size.

Second—Twelve sacks or sugar or any 100-pound sacks.

Third—Six sacks of nitre or sacks of an equivalent weight.

Fourth—Twelve sacks of wheat.

Fifth—Seven sacks of coffee which weighs over 100 pounds per sack.

Sixth—Twelve sacks of fertilizer (small size) 100 pounds.

Seventh—Sling loads of 1,200 pounds or over must be manned

by two men.

Lumber—(1) That not less than fifteen men shall constitute a gang loading lumber on ships.

(2) That the minimum scale on lumber be 55 cents an hour straight time, 80 cents an hour overtime.

(3) Side runners, hatch tenders, double-winch and donkey drivers and boommen to be paid 65 cents an hour day work, 95 cents an hour overtime, donkey drivers to be allowed one hour each day for getting up steam.

(4) Creosoted lumber, 65 cents an hour day work, 95 cents an hour overtime.

(5) Double-winch and donkey drivers, slingers, boommen, side runners and hatch tenders in all cases, 75 cents an hour day work \$1 an hour overtime—donkey drivers to be allowed one hour each day for getting up steam.

(6) When members are ordered to work at a certain hour, their pay goes on from the hour ordered down.

(7) That stevedore firms and captains applying for men to go from one port to another to work

on vessels shall pay fare of men both ways, providing men fulfill contract, and that they receive full pay while travelling and if ship is not ready to start, men's pay goes on while waiting.

(8) That men's pay goes on while travelling from dock to dock while employed.

(9) That eight hours a day shall constitute a day's work, hours to be 8 a. m. to 12 m., and

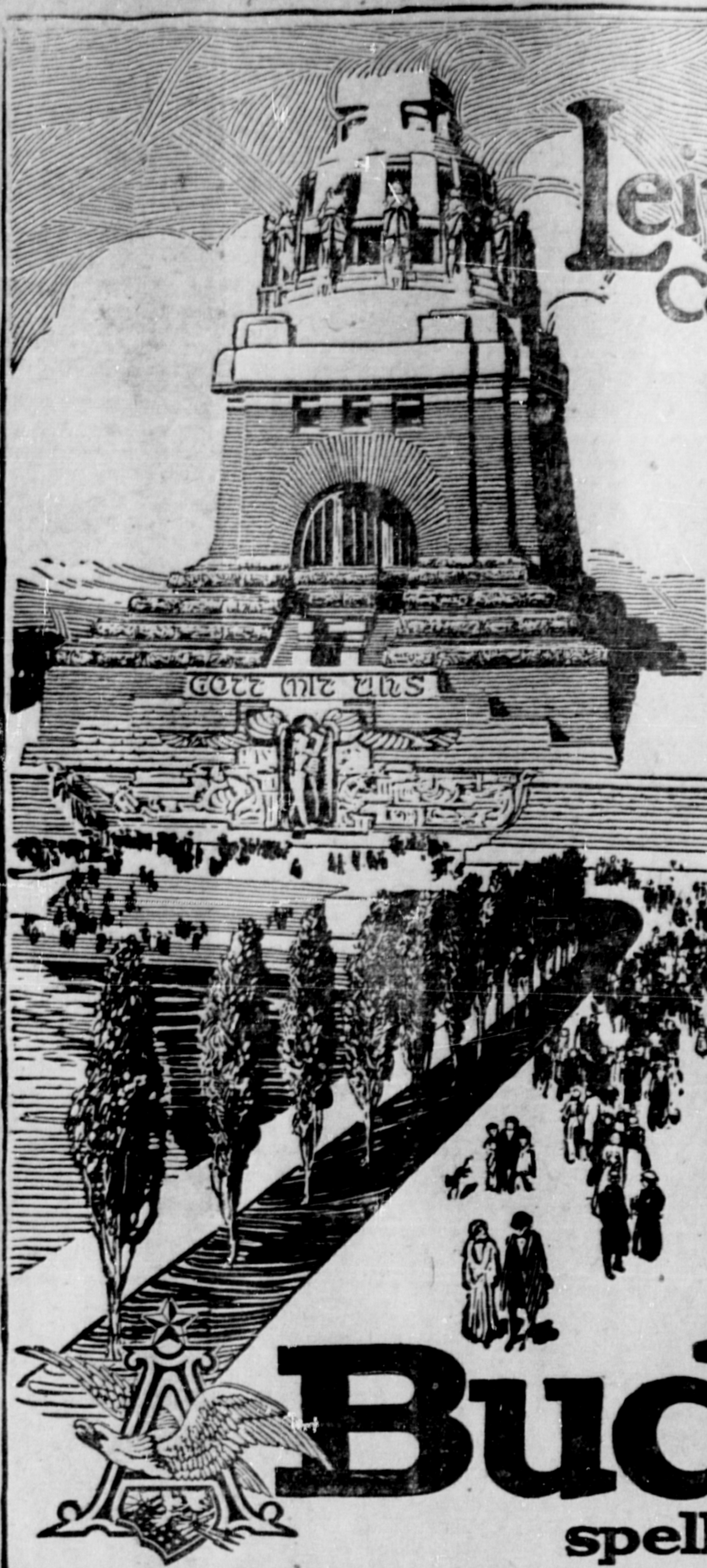
from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m.

(10) All legal holidays and Sundays shall constitute overtime.

A special scale was drawn up for Juneau, and a resolution was

passed protesting against ship employees handling cargoes at that port.

The question of making a big union to include teamsters was discussed but not passed.
