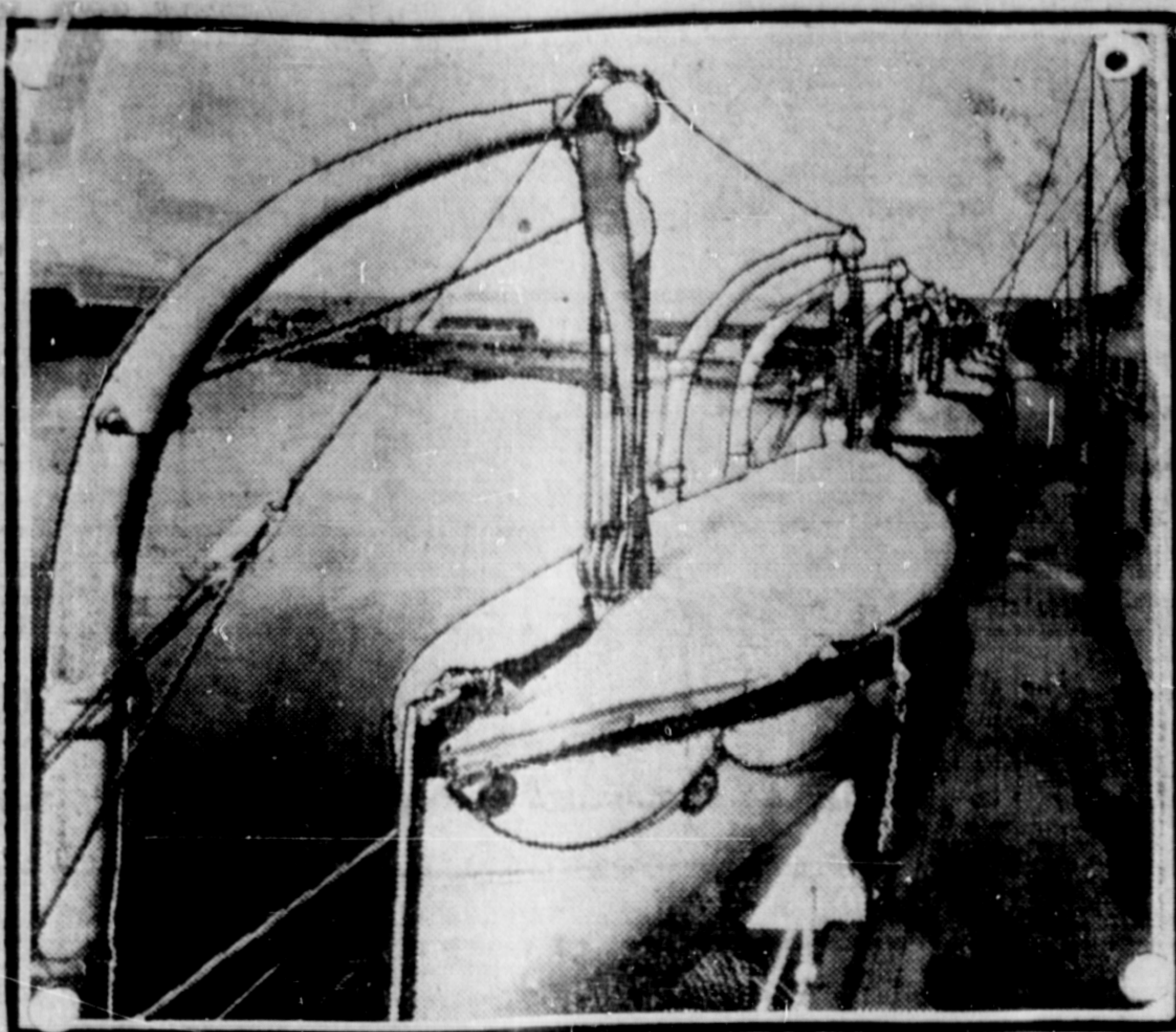

legislation which had passed the Commons.

The Canadian Northern Bill is an entirely different proposition. Both the Government and the Opposition realize that the Canadian Northern must have assistance. The Opposition wanted additional safeguards in the public interests which the Senate by resolution approved. Having done this the Senate has done all that could be expected under the circumstances.

Those astute financiers, McKenzie and Mann, worked the Canadian Northern into a position where the credit of the country was at stake and the country had to come to the rescue. It is also rumored that the failure of the C. N. R. would break one of Canada's strongest banks.

McKenzie and Mann found politicians of the Bowser-McBride stripe very easy marks. When men responsible for the government of the country will place themselves in the power of financial pirates whose interests are wholly selfish, there is very little chance for the people. It simply means that the people have to pay.

Seal Fisheries

Newfoundland advices say the seal fisheries of the season just closed were more successful financially than those of last year. Twenty steamers, employing 4,000 men, set out on the hunt two months ago. Nineteen vessels returning with the pelts of 233,718 seals, valued at \$500,000.

For the fishermen, the financial success has been shrouded in gloom by the enormous loss of life in the hunt, the steamer Newfoundland's catastrophe having cost seventy-eight lives, and 174 men having gone down with the Southern Cross.

To Section Six Property Owners

To the Editor of The Daily News.

Dear Sir.—At the time the different by-laws were up before the Council for final adoption a number of property owners affected appeared and made a protest against the proposed works, and as a consequence the matter was held over in order to enable the property owners as well as the Council to more fully have the different contentions looked into and discussed.

A public meeting for this purpose will be held in the Council chamber tonight at 8 p.m.

Although there is a large number of property owners affected who are opposed to the re-decking of these streets, there seems to be also a large number in favor of the work being proceeded with, and I take this opportunity to urge upon all parties interested in this question to attend the proposed meeting and discuss the matter.

Personally I have been called upon by people representing both sides, the one pointing to the ridiculous idea of re-decking the present plank roads, and the other to the absurdity of digging 16 or 25 foot trenches along our streets and to the idea of financing for permanent work at a time when it is difficult to finance for temporary improvements.

The desire of the Council in the matter is to protect the safety of the general public, and I think all will agree that those streets are in such a condition that something will have to be done.

Seattle, June 11.—Because Tony Prococio, employed by the Northern Pacific, sank his false teeth twice into the hand and arm of Nick Detrame during a short but decisive battle between the two recently, Detrame appeared before Justice John E. Carroll yesterday and asked for the most potent legal vengeance that was in stock, declaring that his arm would be out of commission for at least thirty days.

Figuring that each bite was worth \$10, Detrame asked \$20 for these damages and \$1.50 per day for thirty days, the time in which he would likely be unable to work, the whole amounting to eighty-five dollars.

Detrame has garnished Prococio's wages until the case is settled. Prococio will answer the charge of assault in the second degree before Judge Carroll on May 12th.
