HARRY HAMBLIN GOT \$200 FOR SLANDER

George Borderions Defendant In
Action—Also Made
Apology

The Hamblin vs. Borderions
action was disposed of in the
high court yesterday afternoon
and proved to be the shortest case
of the session. A. M. Manson for
plaintiff; L. W. Patmore for de-
fendant.

Harry Hamblin, the plaintiff,
testified that on the night of May
13th in Dyke's restaurant the de-
fendant had uttered slanderous
statements about witness, the re-
marks being made in connection
with a fire four years ago which
had burned out the business of
both plaintiff and defendant.
Several persons were in the res-
taurant at the time. In cross-
examination the witness said that
Borderions was no drunk.

A. S. Johnstone, Alf. Goodman
confirmed the evidence.

Constable Adams had taken
names of witnesses present, and
Constable Grady said the defend-
ent on the day following the al-
leged slander had said he had
given Hamblin a "bawling out."

The defence of Borderions was
that he had been drinking and
did not know just what he did say
and did not mean it. He made
a full apology and offered to pay
costs.

In passing judgment, His Lord-
ship said drunkenness was no ex-
cuse for crime. Frequently wine
gave men courage to say what
they would like to say when sober.
Being drunk is a voluntary
act and a man has to take the
consequences of it. He assumed
the plaintiff was not suing to
get money but to clear his char-
acter. Considering all the cir-
cumstances he awarded the
plaintiff \$200 and costs.

Lots of Raspberries

Present indications are that
the raspberry crop will be very
heavy this season. The large
area of bushes that was burned
in the fire which swept around
the town two years ago is now
beginning to recover and will be
again producing berries this year.

SCOW IS WRECKED

Load of Oats Lost in Fort George
Canyon Last Monday
Morning

On Monday last a scow loaded
with oats and produce belonging
to Austin Bros., South Fort
George, and in charge of Scow-
man George Williams, was total-
ly wrecked on the dangerous
rocks of the Fort George can-
yon.

Fortunately the crew and some
passengers who were being car-
ried were picked up by a passing
steamer shortly after the wreck
occurred and brought back to
Fort George.

This is the fourth scow that
has been wrecked this season,
and in each case the cargo has
been a total loss. While so far
there has been no loss of life, if
the practice of carrying passen-
gers on these cheaply construct-
ed scows is continued it is only
a matter of time when a serious
accident attended by loss of life
is sure to happen. It would seem
that this is a matter for the au-
thorities to investigate.—Tribune.

To Move the Bank

The Union Bank of Canada
awarded the contract to Ruddy
& McKay to move the present
bank building from the corner of
Pugsley Street and Thirtieth
Avenue to the rear of the lots
owned by the bank on Ninth Ave.

Until the new building is ready
the old building will be utilized,
and afterwards the log building
will be used for living quarters
for the staff. Manager E. B. Tat-
chell says that a lot of new fur-
niture for the bank has been or-
dered and he expects it here in a
few days.—Omineca Herald.

THE ALASKA TROLLERS PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION

Word comes down from Union
Bay that the salmon trollers of
that region have organized the
Alaska Trollers Protective Asso-
ciation and plan to ship their fish
direct to Seattle and the southern
markets instead of selling to the
middle-men. The men figure that
they can make better money sel-
ling direct than by disposing of
their catch to the middle curers and
jobbers. They will secure agents
in Tacoma and Portland, in ad-
dition to Seattle and make the
organization permanent if possi-
ble. The first shipment of fish
went south on June 5th.

Judgment Upheld

Washington, June 23.—The
Supreme Court of the United
States sustained the Missouri
judgment of ouster against the
Harvester Trust and held that it
must pay a fine of \$25,000 impos-
ed under the State Anti-Trust
Law.

The Trust at the same time es-
caped fines that had been impos-
ed in Kansas.

Success at Fishing

The Indians of Hazelton are
having success this year fishing
at the Hagwilget canyon. Spring
salmon are running in large
numbers and some very large fish
have been pulled out. Many citi-
zens and visitors watch the na-
tives fishing on the rocks below
the high level bridge.

HUERTA REFUSES TO LEAVE MEXICO IN BRITISH SHIP

Vera Cruz, Mexico, June 23.—
British subjects who arrived here
from Mexico City yesterday re-
ported a recent clash between
Provisional President Huerta
and Sir Lionel Carden, the Brit-
ish Minister.

The dispute arose out of the
advice volunteered by Sir Lionel
that the de facto president should
resign and leave the country im-
mediately. The British Minister
also offered General Huerta
British safe conduct and a war-
ship to take him and his family
to any port he might name.

General Huerta is said to have
become enraged and to have
threatened to arrest Sir Lionel
Carden if he ever repeated his
proposal.

ance.

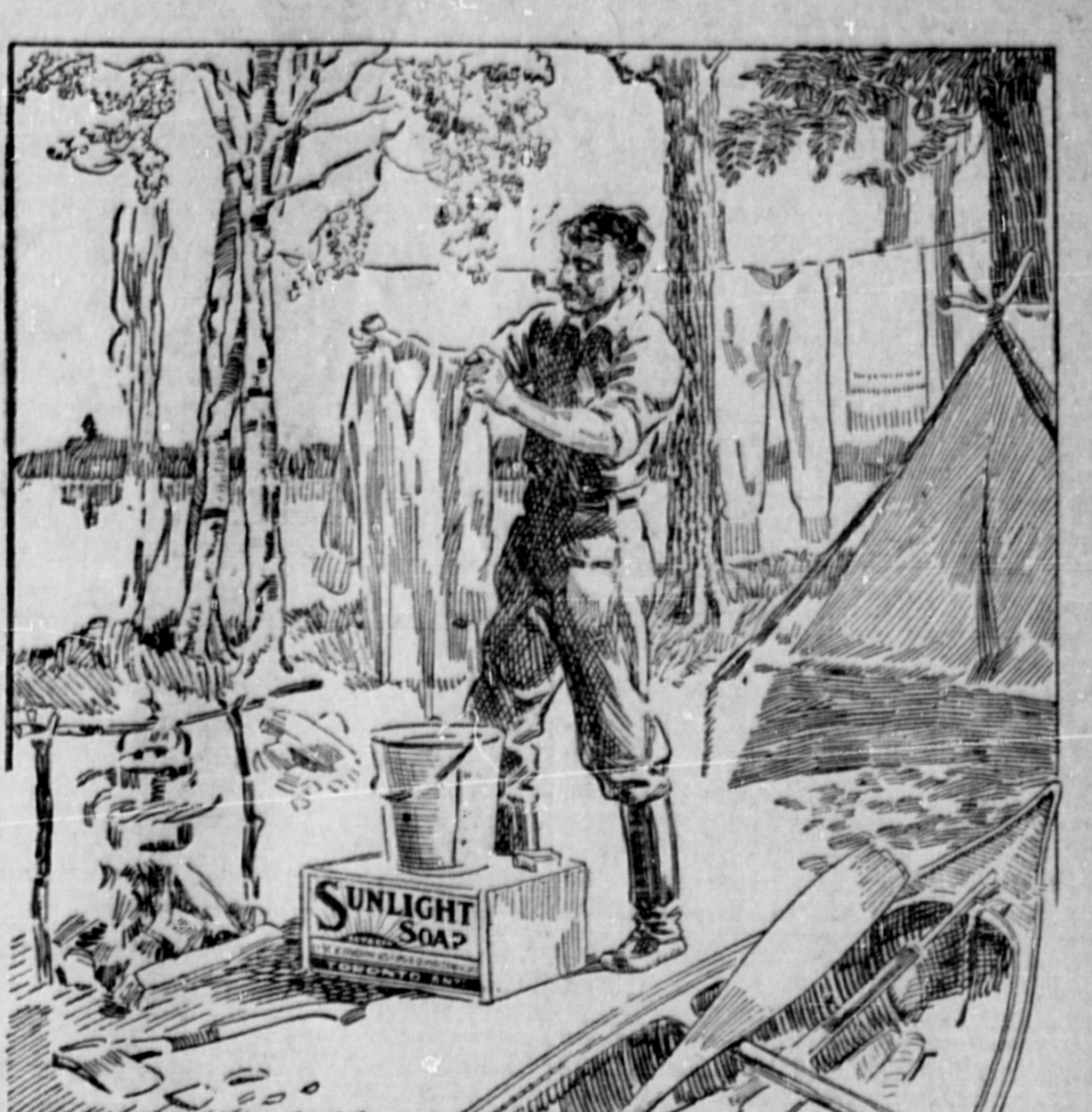
Messages were read yesterday
