## ENCOURAGE OUR CITIZENS WHEN OUR CITY NEEDS HELP

MAYOR NEWTON'S PRINCIPLE ENUNCIATED AGAIN LAST NIGHT OVER APPOINTMENT OF A NEW FIREMAN—OTHERS CLAIM FIRE DEPARTMENT SHOULD HAVE EXPERTS.

Fire Chief Dan McDonald has recommended to the Council through the Fire committee the appointment of J. R. Morrison to be fireman at a salary of \$90 per month. The fire chief reports that Mr. Morrison has had five years' practical experience in fire brigade work, and is an efficient man. The committee endorsed the recommendation and reported to that effect to the Council.

It seemed to the Mayor that appointments to the city departments ought to be made as often as at all possible out of the ranks of citizen workmen. He asked if the fireman recommended were a citizen, and if so for how long had he been a citizen. No one seemed to know, but Alderman Douglas expressed the opinion that the fire department had to have the best possible hands, irrespective of citizenship claims.

The Mayor acidly replied: "I was merely asking for information, Alderman Douglas," and the

Finance Minister subsided. For the Fire committee Alderman Kerr supported Alderman Douglas in the contention that the very best man to be found is none too good for the fire department of Prince Rupert, and Alderman Montgomery asked the Mayor if he would himself in his own business be ready to afford the use of his printing office to any amateur citizen typesetter or mechanic anxious to learn the trade rather than to the best trained workman he could get from outside.

The Mayor did not reply to this, and Alderman Montgomery went on to say that Prince Rupert cannot afford to train firemen at this stage of her civic career. The Mayor, however, feels that it is hard on citizens here striving to make good if the city cannot afford to use their services in preference to those of outsiders. The report was adopted after discussion.

## CONTRACTORS IN DISPUTE ON ENGINEER'S AUTHORITY

MESSRS. ROSANG & OLSEN WISH TO DISCUSS THEIR GRADING ACCOUNT WITH THE COUNCIL BUT REFUSE TO ACCEPT CITY ENGINEER'S FINAL RULING.

In a letter to the City Council last night Messrs Rosang & Olsen made a claim for the settlement of their account for street grading. They refused in the letter to recognize the authority of the City Engineer in any way in regard to the settlement of this account.

In terms of their contract the City Engineer is made the sole arbiter of any claims that may require settlement and all disputes that may arise.

Alderman Montgomery pointed out that no claim for incidentals or extras accompanied the communication from Rosang & Olsen, and argued that the firm seemed anxious to get out of the

necessity of having their account considered by the City Engineer. He thought that they wanted to railroad a bunch of extras onto the Council and have a settlement made when the members of the Council had no means of estimating the extras.

Alderman Montgomery moved that the firm be asked to send in a full statement of all their claims, including extras, to the Council. The account could then be considered by the Council advised by the City Engineer. If no definite settlement could be arrived at then the Council would be prepared to go into the matter with the contractors.

Alderman Montgomery's motion carried.

## RETURNS FROM THE SMELTER

Silver-Lead Ore from Northern Terminus Mines Runs Hundred and Twenty-five Dollars to the Ton on First Smelter Test.

William Sloan is back from Tacoma, where he went with ten and a half tons of practically surface ore from the claims on American Creek, Portland Canal district, owned by the Northern Terminus Mines Company, Limited. The values in silver and lead from this first trial shipment runs \$120 to the ton, which may be accepted as distinctly encouraging.

Mr. Sloan says he hopes to do development work on a larger scale this season and will start as soon as possible with about twelve men. They have a shaft down forty feet right on the ore and at that depth it was twenty-two inches wide in clear gray copper for two hundred feet. This ore assayed \$275 the ton. The company has nine claims and on one has a tunnel in sixty feet. Altogether Mr. Sloan estimated they have \$200,000 worth of ore in sight and calculates to mine and ship this and make it pay for the necessary machinery as it goes. The claims are four miles from the Red Cliff mines, along a good trail, and the ore can be placed on the cars at Red Cliff.

## AND THERE WAS LIGHT

Every Citizen Ready With Wires Can Have Juice on Thursday—Arc Lights on Streets in Ten Days.

On Thursday everyone having electric wiring ready for current may have the juice turned on. Supt. Matthews has the new units in order. They have been passed by the expert. They can turn on the juice.

In ten days, too, the city will be lighted by arc light—very different from the dim religious incandescent glow lamp clusters which have feebly struggled with the darkness during the winter, and made themselves almost more visible by day than by night, owing to the peculiarities of the first juice extractor erected at the plant.

"Let there be light, and there was light," remarked Alderman Montgomery most irreverently when he heard the news announced last night by Ald. Kerr, chairman of the Light Committee.

## HOTEL CASE IS DISMISSED

## PROGRESS ON WATER SCHEME

Acropolis Hill Reservoir Excavation Completed at Cost Per Yard Below Estimate—Pipe Line Economically Proceeding.

Excavation for the Acropolis Hill reservoir was completed on the 11th inst., and cost per cubic yard of rock removed an average of \$2.55. The total cost was \$6,500, and there were 2,550 yards to remove. Thinning of the pipe line has cost from \$3.31 to \$3.78 per cubic yard. The estimated cost for this was \$4 per yard, and the City Engineer believes that the remainder of the work will be completed below estimated cost also. There are three gangs of men on the work now, and piling of the most difficult part of the pipe line is being carried on.

Curacao Carried Big Mail. The Curacao got here from Skagway at 7 o'clock this morning with a few passengers for Prince Rupert from the north. She left shortly afterward with a very heavy mail for the south.
