## WILL STUDY OYSTER CULTURE ON THIS COAST

Dr. Stafford, of McGill University, Here in Employ of Provincial Government

The Provincial Government is now taking up the question of oyster development on the Coast and Dr. Stafford of McGill University Zoological Department, is employed during his summer vacation to look into this.

Dr. Stafford has just arrived in Prince Rupert, having examined conditions along the coast as far as Bella Bella. At the latter place he found good samples of the western oyster. Whether or not they exist in this locality is not yet known. One disadvantage to their development here is the fact that the waters near the shore are usually deep while the oysters thrive better in a comparatively shallow water.

Speaking of the value of the western oyster as compared to those of the East, Dr. Stafford says that the flavor is largely an acquired affair and that the chief difference is that the Western oyster is smaller.

The Doctor will examine conditions in this district and prepare a report for the Government as to his findings.

### The Empress

## ROBBERS DIG TUNNEL—TAKE LOOT IN WAGON

One Man Arrested When He Returns to Cash Store Cheque for \$708

Tacoma, July 7.—Tunneling their way through a thick brick wall, only to find the cash register open and empty, cracksmen returned to the Shaw department store at Buckley the night following their first attempt, broke through the same hole, which had been temporarily obstructed, loaded up a wagon with \$1,000 worth of merchandise and jewelry and made their getaway.

This morning a man who looked like a lumberjack, walked boldly into the Citizens' Bank at Buckley, stepped to the counter, coolly signed an indorsement and slapped down a \$708 cheque, part of the booty taken from the department store, and asked the cashier to give him the money.

The cashier called Town Marshal Slattery and when the stranger was arrested the marshal said he confessed to a share in the robbery. The prisoner refused to give the name of his accomplice, although the marshal said he admitted he had one.

## ARCHBISHOP SCORES LOW-NECKED DRESSES

Advices Women Wearing Them Not to Approach the Communion Table

Kingston, Ont., July 7.—Archbishop Spratt told the women in St. Mary's Cathedral at morning mass that he would prefer that all those who wore low-necked dresses should not present themselves for communion, as he considered it most disrespectful for them to approach the altar in garments that exposed the neck beyond the limit of decency.

His grace has, on various occasions expressed himself against low-necked dresses and slit skirts. A number of women who had intended taking communion did not do so as a result of the archbishop's admonition.
