Reports from the Canadian Prairies and indeed from add over the continent declare that the condition of this year's crops is far ahead of that of last year and of all proceeding years. A somewhat late spring was followed by excellent weather and good rains so that conditions are very favorable for a bumper crop. Not only, however, is the quality of crop better than preceding years but the acreage is also very materially increased. Of course the final results can never be known till the last sheaf is reaped but it is very satisfactory to know that conditions so far are so favorable.

The money set loose by even an average crop in Canada is enormous. With an extra big crop there is just that much to the good.

While the crops contribute very materially toward the prosperity of the country it was not because of any failure of crops that we have had the quiet times of the last few years. The average crop for those years was comparatively high. It does not necessarily follow, therefore, that a big crop this year would put the country back where it belongs. There are other indications abroad, however, that the universal stringency is about over and that the old time prosperity is about to return.

Money rates have dropped to almose the vanishing point and this big surplus will soon be looking for investment. Selfishness after all is one of the biggest driving powers in the!
