LADIES REPORT COLLECTIONS FOR CANADA HOSPITAL SHIP

ENERGETIC WORK BY LADIES REALIZED OVER DOUBLE THE AMOUNT ASKED FOR—STATEMENT OF RECEIPTS

A most generous response was made by the people of Prince Rupert and vicinity, to the appeal of the women of Prince Rupert for funds to assist in the equipment of the Hospital Ship being furnished by the women of Canada to be used in the present war.

It was decided by the City Council that \$500 was a fair amount to be expected from Prince Rupert and district, as only \$10,000 had been asked from the Province of British Columbia, and as the amount collected was far in excess of \$500, it was thought best to open an emergency fund in the Bank of Montreal of the balance collected.

A telegram was sent yesterday to the Provincial President of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire advising that the sum of \$500 had been placed to their credit in the Bank of Montreal, Victoria, being the share of Prince Rupert and Skeena River Canneries.
