BRITAIN'S WEALTH WILL BE IMPORTANT FEATURE OF WAR

Montreal, Aug. 17.—The organized wealth of the British Empire, a leading banker said today, would become one of the dominant factors in the present conflict. He pointed out that while a generation ago the number of great banks of the world with deposits of one hundred million dollars and over were less than a dozen, at the present time there is sixty-one, and the percentage has been largely with Great Britain and her colonies.

While it was true that the great increase in the resources of individual banks in Canada was due in some measure to combinations and absorptions, the growth of the larger Canadian banking institutions were based very largely upon the accumulation of material wealth in the country. He pointed out that out of sixty one great banks in the world, Canada has three, the Canadian Bank of Commerce, ranking 23rd in the list, the Bank of Montreal 25th, and the Royal Bank of Canada 29th.

POLICE STOP WAR FILM

San Francisco, August 15.—The police yesterday, closed a moving picture house and arrested the proprietor on a charge of inciting a riot, because pictures were shown purporting to represent the Franco-Prussian war.

Hotel managers throughout the city have ordered their orchestras to play no national or patriotic airs, not even Hungarian dance music. Repeated clashes among offended guests taught the managers that absolute and impartial suppression was the course of wisdom.

Dredge for Alaska

Nilson & Kelez, Seattle, have secured the contract for building a 3½ cubic ft. Bucyrus dredge, having a capacity of 2,800 yards per day, which is to be operated on Mimuk Creek, Alaska. The dredge will be erected at the Nilson & Kelez yards and then knocked down for shipment to Alaska.

BELGIUM IS POPULOUS AND PROSPEROUS

Belgium is the most densely populated and one of the most prosperous of European countries. Her area of 11,373 square miles, not much bigger than two or three Ontario counties, supports a population of 7,423,000. The Government spends in the neighborhood of \$150,000,000 a year. The imports amount to \$900,000,000, the exports to \$750,000,000. The army has a peace strength of 45,000 men and a war strength of 175,000 men. The navy is non-existent. There are 5,401 miles of railways, and 25,000 miles of excellent roads. Two cities—Antwerp and Liege—are very strongly fortified.
