RECENT HAPPENINGS

C. W. Bailey, of the city police force, has returned from the south on the Chelohsin, where he has been on a vacation.

Captain McIntosh and W. Kramer, two Victoria men, largely interested in Graham Island, returned from Masset last week and went south on the Princess Beatrice. They are both as enthusiastic as ever about Graham Island, which they consider has an excellent future for mixed farming. Captain McIntosh is actively engaged in the development of part of his holdings near Massett.

W. Garde is in town from his contracts up the inlet. He is building a new powder magazine and wharf for the Western Explosives Co. A great improvement has been made in the method of handling this dangerous substance at the new depot. A float and stairway is being put in to facilitate the loading and unloading of motor boats. This new magazine is to replace the old one across the harbor, which, owing to recent developments for town-site and industrial purposes has been condemned as unsafe and the use of which is now discontinued.

Staff Sergeant O'Brien, a veteran of the R. N. W. M. P., and South African veteran, left town on the Venture en route to London. He intends joining the staff of General French at the front. Mr. Oliver was with General French on the latter's famous ride from Blomfontein to Pretoria. Mr. Oliver is only one of many ex-service men in Rupert, who have already left for the front.

A searchlight was easily playing on the harbor last evening, and it was very interesting to see

the way the light suddenly picked out small craft on the water.

Several local parties were out over the week-end hunting deer and wild fowl. They report deer very shy, and hard to get. Prince Rupert's increasing population now renders the task of getting venison much harder than it was in the early days, when a trip across the harbor at this time of the year generally met with success when hunting for deer.

It is rumored that the government is about to do some more clearing and improvement work around the wireless station on Digby Island. If true, this should be a great boon to the many idle men in town.

The war excitement has taken a great hold of the Prince Rupert's younger generation and the youngsters all seem to be busy learning how to play the bugle. How about the Boy Scouts? A local corps might easily be formed as Prince Rupert can certainly boast of a plentiful supply of strapping youth.

From accounts of people reaching Prince Rupert from Edmonton and the interior, things are much quieter than in Prince Rupert. The busiest town seen on the trip through was Vanderwort, near Francis Lake, where considerable activity in the building line was in evidence.

REV. JOHN McNEILL HAS CALL FROM DENVER

Pastor of Cooke's Church May Go to Colorado City From Toronto.

After a considerable amount of disagreement over the choice of a candidate, the selection committee of one of the largest Presbyterian churches in Denver, Col., has solved the problem by sending a call to Rev. John McNeill, pastor of Cooke's Presbyterian Church, Toronto. Numerous candidates, it seems, had preached before the committee, but an agreement as to choice of one of these candidates could not be reached. Mr. McNeill never preached in Denver, and the call it is understood, came as a surprise. It is considered probable that he will accept the offer.

Mr. McNeill, it is understood, had been considering removing from Toronto for some time on account of the health of his eldest boy. Medical men in the city had assured Mr. McNeill that his son should not remain in this climate, but should be removed to one milder and more equable.

CANADIAN NEWS IN BRIEF.

The army worm has made its appearance in Nova Scotia.

Thirty thousand dollars were collected on tag day in Toronto for a hospital ship.

The government of Nova Scotia is contributing 100,000 tons of coal for such purposes as will best serve the interests of the Empire at the present time.

Rev. J. D. McEwen, who has spent some years as a missionary in Brazil, preached in Oxford Street Methodist Church on Sunday morning and in Trinity Church in the evening.

The executive of the Halifax Canadian Club has voted \$1,000 to the Canadian National Fund for the assistance of the families of those who have given up their positions in obedience to the call for active military service.

Four hundred and eighty-two of Vancouver's foreign population have applied to become naturalized British subjects since August 1, doubtless on account of the war. Thirty-seven Germans and 19 Austrians wish to desert their home land. More than 200 applications came from Japanese who wish to qualify to serve in Canadian regiments to be sent to England. Judge Brant, before whom the applications come, has asked the Minister of Justice what he will do with this great prospective influx of citizenship.

The Hon. E. H. Armstrong, Commissioner of Public Works and Mines, on behalf of the province of Nova Scotia, has handed over the new building at the Nova Scotia Hospital to the naval department for housing any wounded sailors brought into this port. The staff of physicians and nurses at the Nova Scotia Hospital has generously volunteered its services. The hospital will be able to accommodate about fifty men at an hour's notice. If cots can be obtained there will be room for many more men.

BUILDERS' REQUEST REFUSED

Building Trades Unwilling to Have Wages Cut in Half.

Montreal, Sept. 14.—The Contractors' Association of Montreal has asked men engaged in the building business in Montreal to accept half wages until conditions improve. The business board of the men's organization has decided not to accept a cut.

The serious step of suspending all standing agreements between masters and men in the building trades is to be considered at an extraordinary meeting of building trades members in the Labor Temple. The labor leaders are faced with the problem of scanty labor and increased cost of living.

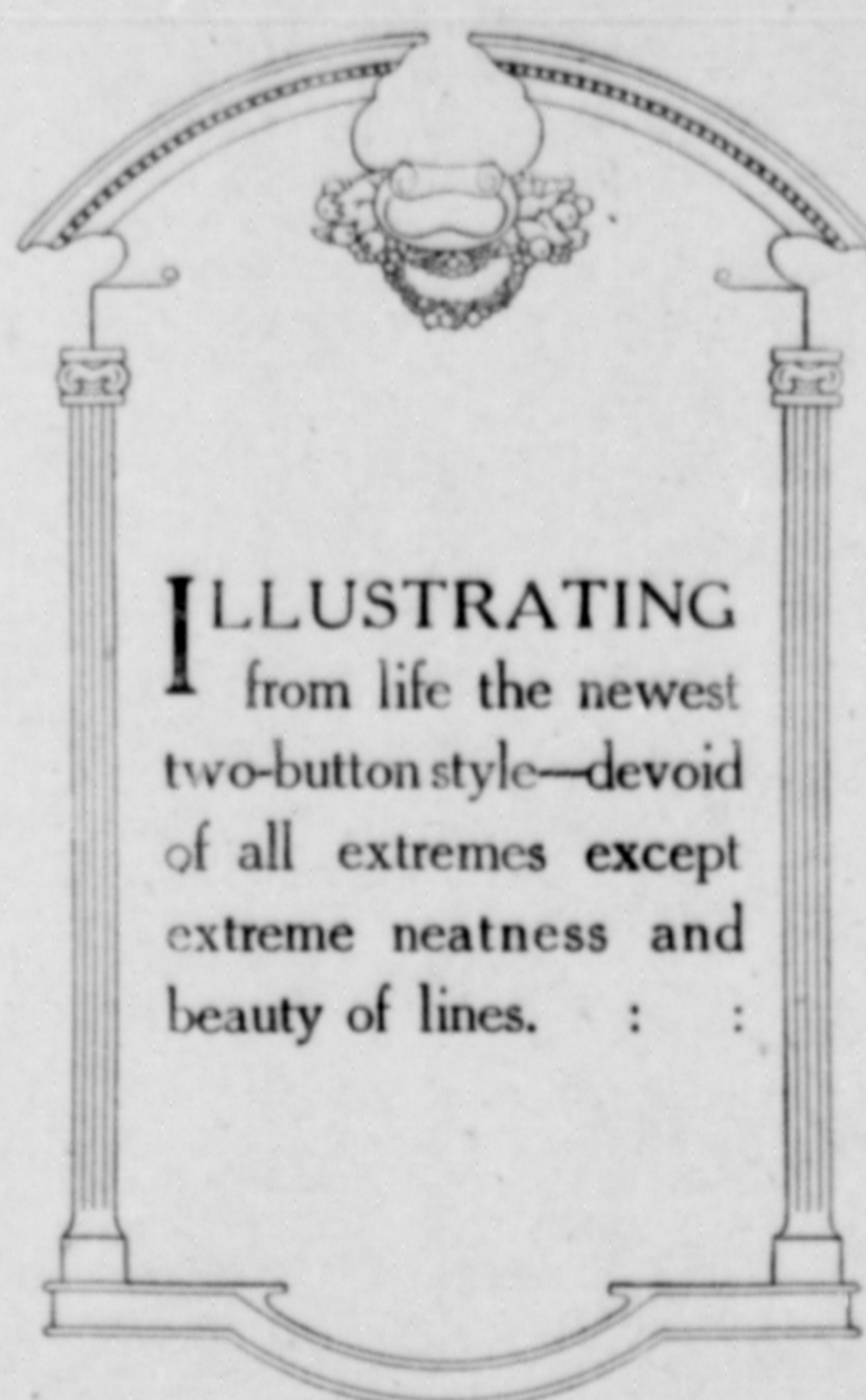

RED CROSS ORGANIZER TELLS THRILLING TALE

London, Sept. 14.—Mrs. Stobart, who went to Brussels in the middle of August to establish a hospital under the auspices of the Belgian Red Cross, has returned to London after thrilling experiences. While trying to get from Brussels through the German lines she was arrested with her party outside of Louvain and taken in a coal truck to Tongres, where she declares she was submitted to insulting treatment as a suspected spy at the hands of German officers.

Mrs. Stobart and her party spent the night in a guardroom, expecting to be shot in the morning. They were, however, sent on to Cologne. They were deprived of all their documents and mobbed by crowds of howling German soldiers at Liege, Aachen and other stopping places. They were finally liberated, and escaped through Holland after encountering many difficulties.
