RED CROSS NURSES.

Ottawa, Sept. 22.—The 400 Red Cross nurses who are to accompany the Canadian expeditionary force will be finally selected tomorrow, and they will be ordered to Valcartier at the end of the week. There were no less than six hundred applications from young women in all parts of Canada and the United States for positions as Red Cross nurses. Forty of these have had previous experience in war service, and all of these have been accepted.

GREAT BATTLE OF AISNE DEVELOPED INTO SIEGE ALLIES ON OFFENSIVE

(Special to The Daily News—1:30 P. M.)

London, Sept. 22.—The allied troops have appeared around Peronne, attacking the German extreme right at St. Quentin, evidently in line with a plan to outflank the enemy on the left of where the present British forces are.

The Germans have constructed a series of small fortresses along 100 miles of the banks of the Oise to Meuse and the great battle of Aisne has developed into a siege.

Experts believe that only one result can come out of such a situation, and that is the defeat of the besieged.

The Germans suffered heavily in hand-to-hand fighting at Crayonne yesterday. The Allies have made progress where the greatest danger threatens the invaders. The German right is imperilled at Noyon and their line of retreat threatened at Stenay.

SITUATION IN FRANCE STILL UNCHANGED— ENEMY VERY ACTIVE

Paris, Sept. 22.—The official announcement says the Germans were active yesterday but without any appreciable results. On our left wing, on the right bank of the River Oise, the Germans had to fall back before the Allies' attack. The situation between the Oise and the Aisne is unchanged.

On the center, between Rheims and Sionis, the enemy attempted an offensive movement which was repulsed, while between Souain and Argonne we have made some progress.

There is no change between Argonne and the Meuse. The Germans made violent attempts to gain the heights of the Meuse along the right front between Trassauvaux and Handicourt, but could not gain the position.

On our right wing in Lorraine the Germans have reoccupied Donestre.

CITY COUNCIL BRIEFS

The city will lay a two-inch water pipe to the municipal wharf in Section Two.

The Northern B. C. Agricultural Association requested the City Council to declare a holiday the second day of the fair, October 1. This was agreed to.

The city clerk received a reply to the letter which he wrote to the commission looking into the high cost of living complaining of the price of coal in Prince Rupert. It will be looked into.

Bids were received by the Council from several automobile companies giving prices on tires for the fire truck. It was referred to the board of works with power to act.

The Union of B. C. Municipalities will hold its annual meeting in Kamloops October 22 and 23. A communication was read at the Council meeting asking that a representative be sent. Action on this was deferred.

One of the aldermen last evening pointed out that there were at present three trains coming to Fort George, while only two came through to Prince Rupert. This was considered unfair, and an attempt may be made to get it remedied.

H. S. Wallace Co. wrote the City Council last night asking that in view of the improbability of work starting this year on the postoffice, the sidewalk be widened to the usual width. The city engineer was instructed to order the government engineer to have this done.

In the estimates read by the Council last night was an item of some seven thousand dollars for water pipe manufactured in Germany. Alderman Morrissey wanted to know if the war affected this contract. The city solicitor pointed out that the contract was with a Canadian limited company which could get its pipe where it wished. It was ordered paid.

The city clerk reported that the petitions against the redecking of Fifth and Sixth avenues were insufficiently signed to prove effective.

In connection with this discussion it was pointed out that two-thirds of this work was already done and hence could not be paid by bylaw but out of the general funds. The city solicitor will report on this.

The present censor on wireless messages is working a hardship on local merchants, who cannot get in touch with vessels carrying their freights. This was brought up at the Council but it was felt that since all ships were dismantled of their wireless apparatus it would be impossible to get the service resumed at present, especially while there were hostile cruisers on the Coast.

ANOTHER BRITISH STEAMER WAS SUNK BY A CONTACT MINE

Trebison, Asia Minor (Via London), Sept. 22.—The British steamer Belgian King went down near Cape Kureil yesterday, supposedly from striking a mine. Twenty-two were drowned and 98 were saved by a Russian steamer.
