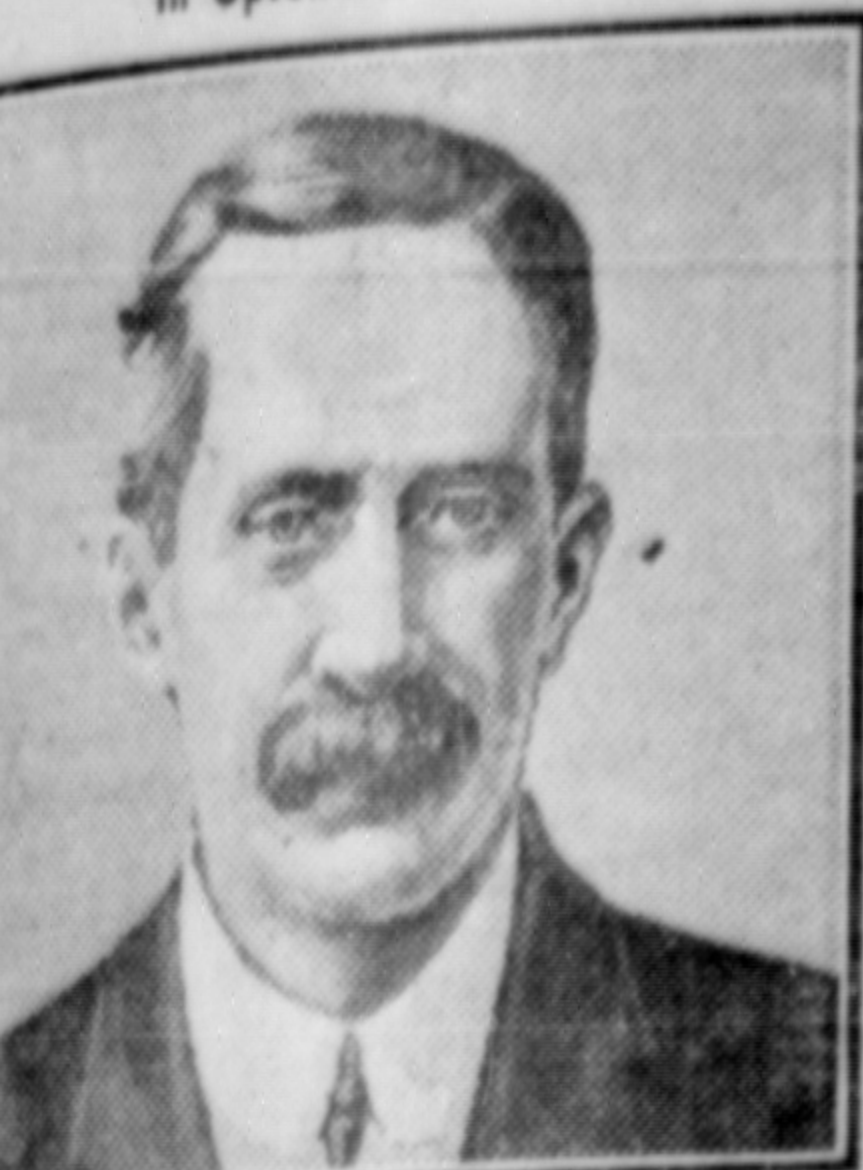

**DO NOT ANTICIPATE
WORLD-WIDE DISASTER**

**American Financiers Believe That
Allies Have Situation
Well in Hand.**

New York, Oct. 3.—Buying orders are reported in various quarters of the street as increasing. Investigation points to a sentiment that the Allies at least have conditions well in hand and that no world-wide financial ruin is to be expected. Conversations held with investors indicate that they entertained a great fear in this respect in contemplating the Prussian military. Winter wheat is reported going into the ground this season in place of cotton in anticipation of a great curtailment of the wheat crop the world over outside of America as a result of the war.

This condition is being referred to by bears on wheat above one dollar. The money situation is causing a great deal of complaint throughout the street. This complaint is being directed at the banks. Rumors are current that the government will probably take a hand in the situation in the near future.

It is declared in some quarters that the reopening of the exchanges would be hastened thereby. Western prosperity is becoming more in evidence than for some time. It is reported from Chicago that the outlook for winter wheat is very good as a result of the high prices for the grain crop. It is declared that Eastern manufacturing centers will soon begin to feel the effects of agricultural prosperity.

After drilling, the guard marched up Bay Street and proceeded via Queen, Yonge and Shuter Streets to the Arena, which was opened to them on account of the rain. Here they were addressed by President Falconer, who spoke a few words of encouragement to them, emphasizing the necessity of the sacrifices everyone was called upon to make. General Otter, the colonel-in-chief, was on parade, as was also Professor Wrong and Mr. W. S. Dinnick. Five of the companies are now up to full strength.
