### ESSINGTON MAN MUST STAY IN JAIL

Chief Justice Hunter Declines to Interfere with W. W. Slagle's Sentence.

Vancouver, Oct. 6.—W. W. Slagle, a blacksmith of Port Essington, must serve out the sentence of six months' imprisonment passed upon him by Dr. R. W. Large, J. P., recently for selling liquor without a license. Slagle's proceedings to have the conviction quashed by way of certiorari fell to the ground. "I see no reason why I should interfere with the sentence of the magistrate," decided Chief Justice Hunter.

Mr. C. W. Craig, for Slagle, argued that the evidence all went to show that the liquor had been sold by Mrs. Slagle while her husband was away from the room. "One piece of evidence is evidently a stenographer's error. A witness named Johnson is made to say that he bought a bottle of whisky and drank it at Slagle's, while what he obviously meant to say and probably did say is that he 'brought' a bottle of whisky to the place, etc."

Counsel made progress with his case until Chief Justice Hunter decided to read the evidence for himself. "Why, this must have been a regular drinking resort," said the judge. "The witnesses say that liquor was found in bottles in a cupboard in the kitchen, and the evidence shows that the kitchen floor was littered with 'dead-soldiers.' I notice a lot of defence witnesses say they

had brought bottles to the place. Seems to have been a resort for drinking on a wholesale scale. This woman, I see, sold the informant a glass of whisky for 50 cents in a bedroom and her husband brought the liquor upstairs. That shows agency on the part of the woman. It also shows the character of the place. The application is refused."

Mr. W. M. McKay appeared for the crown. Slagle filed a bond of \$100 before the hearing to cover crown costs in order to get the case heard. This was impounded, as the rule that the crown neither gives nor takes costs does not apply to certiorari proceedings.
