MORE TALK ABOUT GENERAL ELECTION

Believed That Decision Will Be Arrived At Latter Part of Week.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 13.—Rumors of an early general election, which seem to be prevalent throughout the country, may turn out to be true, but it can be safely stated that up to the present moment no definite decision has been arrived at by the cabinet to appeal to the country in the near future. While ministers of the crown refuse to discuss the question for publication, they do not deny that it has been considered by the cabinet council and rather intimate that a definite decision is likely to be arrived at before the end of the present week.

One member of Parliament who is in the capital asserts that Parliament will be dissolved shortly and that the election may take place as early as Thursday, November 19, and not later than December 10. Other members in the city are equally positive that there will be no election; that the political truce, which has prevailed since the outbreak of the war, will be continued and that Parliament will not meet before January or February. While Conservatives declare that the government will be quite justified in going to the country, Liberals say there should be no election turmoil in Canada at the present time.

The Evening Free Press claims that in view of the fact that a proclamation was issued some time ago suspending the preparation of the voters' list in certain parts of Canada for the year, the holding of an election before January would be contrary to correct constitutional practice.

PROF. ALEXANDER DRAWING BIG CROWDS

CAFE CAR SERVICE STARTS EAST TODAY

The first cafe car service on the G. T. P. went out from Prince Rupert this morning. The new car, which is a combination cafe and parlor car, arrived here on the last train.

A neat little menu card was issued by the company and inscribed "First Cafe Car Service East from Prince Rupert, B. C. Saturday, October 17, 1914." The bill-of-fare, with variety and selection hard to beat, summarized appears below:

Fruits—Oranges (one), 10c; sliced, 15c; two, 20c; sliced, 25c. Preserved raspberries, strawberries or figs, 25c. Orange marmalade or sliced pineapple, 20c.

Cereals—Selected B. C. Rolled Oats, 20c. Corn Flakes, 20c. Shredded Wheat Biscuits, 20c.

Relishes—Individual mixed pickles, chow chow or white onions, 15c.

GERMANS LAID PLANS S. AFRICA UPRISING

Only Small Element Concerned—Will be Quickly Rounded Up and Offenders Shot.

Montreal, Oct. 13.—Mr. Alexander Gray, who was editor of The South African Mining Journal, the official organ of the gold mining industry at the time of the Boer War, in an interview in Montreal today said he thought the Maritz incident would not have any great influence on the general situation in South Africa.

"The re-united races of South Africa," said Mr. Gray, "may be relied on to give the Maritz outbreak in that remote portion of Cape Colony abutting on German Southwest Africa its quietus. Maritz is one of the irreconcilables who cannot understand that the peace of Vereeniging was a lasting compact entered into by Earl Kitchener, Lord Milner, and General Louis Botha, together with others participating in that conference. His outburst will give him more notoriety than success."

"Possibly De Wet, and those disconcerted leaders who have not seen eye to eye with the Botha government, during the reconstruction period when Imperial credit has been extended to the Boer people and throughout which there has been a surprising degree of co-operation notwithstanding the rancor inseparable from the war, may extend a measure of support to Maritz and his rebel following. The outbreak need not arouse the slightest apprehension; for the regular defence forces can count on veterans of these irregular South African veterans, Gen. Braham who served under Colonel Sir Aubrey Wood Sampson; Colonel MacKenzie, Colonel Scovill, Colonel Colenbrander and others, who would rather relish a 'go' at the rebels and their German allies."

"The sum and substance of the Maritz episode is that it was engineered for the purpose of enlisting malcontents in a campaign designed to save German Southwest Africa with its diamonds and other minerals. It so happens German Southwest Africa is valuable—perhaps the only German colony worth a fight. The German bank has financed the colony to a great extent. Hence the Maritz attempt to foment trouble and have the Boers pull German chestnuts out of the fire."
