AUSTRIA OFFERS ITALY BIG PRICE FOR NEUTRALITY

Trentino and Avlona to Be Hand-
ed Over Agreement Reported
to Have Been Reached.
London, Oct. 17.—The Stock-
holm correspondent of The Daily
Telegraph has sent a report from
Austrian sources to the effect that
Austria-Hungary and Italy are on
the eve of concluding an agree-
ment under the terms of which,
in exchange for the maintenance
of Italian neutrality in the war,
Austria-Hungary will cede to It-
aly the Trentino, a district in the
Austrian Tyrol bordering on It-
aly and containing the city of
Trent, and permit a permanent
Italian occupation of Avlona, the
seaport on the Adriatic.
The Telegraph expresses the
opinion that the report would be
received with the utmost caution.

NUMEROUS INQUIRIES ABOUT NEW DISTRICT

G.T. P. Expects Many Settlers to
go to Francois Lake
Next Spring.

Victoria, Oct. 19.—Numerous
inquiries are being received at
the Grand Trunk Pacific offices
from people in different parts of
this continent as to the condi-
tions and prospects for settle-
ment along the route of Cana-
da's new transcontinental rail-
way. C. E. Enny, J. of Vancouver,
general agent of the passenger
department of the G. T. P., in-
formed the press that Jacob Blit-
zen, of Loyalton, South Dakota,
was now on his way into the
Francois Lake district to look for
pre-emptions for twenty-five
families who will move to the
northern country if everything
comes up to the expectations of
Mr. Blitzen.

While during the winter the of-
ficials of the Grand Trunk do not
expect many settlers to make
their way into the center of Brit-
ish Columbia, they are fully con-
fident that next spring many Can-
adians as well as a great many
Americans and Old Country new-
comers will head for the newly
opened section of that vast prov-
ince an dput countless acres of
land under cultivation.

Mr. Jenny said that Mr. Blit-
zen will arrive in the Francois
Lake district by the end of this
week. He will make a careful in-
spection of the land and if it
meets with his liking he will ar-
range for the pre-emption of 25
sections. Crops in the vicinity of
Loyalton have been rather bad for
the past year or two and quite a
few of the farmers decided to sell
out and come to British Colum-
bia. Mr. Blitzen was delegated to
make the trip of inspection and
the others will await his report.
The land around Francois Lake
is exceptionally good and the pio-
neer will no doubt have an easy
time picking out sections suitable
to himself. The railroad passes
quite close to the Lake district.

Many persons are inquiring
about and in other shrdulbrdruu
province, and nex tspring it is ex-
pected that many settlers will
take up land in Central British
Columbia.
