Believes Time Not Far Distant When Oil Will Be Struck in B. C. Oilfields.

from the west coast oil fields of Plain. Graham Island that yet have been brought down by Mr. Alan Stewart, a director of the B. C. Oil Fields Company who has been personally in charge of the drill. ing, and the expert driller, Frank Egan, of Petrolia, who has had charge of the drill during the last few months, were given to The Vancouver Sun last week. "I consider we have proven this to be an old field,' 'said Mr. Stewart "We are now working in a soft gray shale and it is permeated with oil. We are going very carefully now and the drill is down at about 1,150 feet. It would be a calamity if anything were to happen to the drill now.
