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CONSTANTINOPLE REPORTS 14,000 BRITISH ALONG SUEZ CANAL

London, Oct. 29.—The British government, during the last few days, has sent numerous territorial troops to Egypt, according to news received from well informed quarters in Constantinople, says a Reuter dispatch from Constantinople, via Berlin.

"Fourteen thousand troops," says the dispatch, "have been stationed along the Suez Canal."

"In Turkish diplomatic circles the concentration of British troops in Egypt is much discussed and declared to be an infringement of neutrality. It is pointed out that the consent of the Porte is necessary for all loans, but this was not obtained for the loan of \$25,000,000, destined for agricultural purposes in Egypt."

THE AEROPLANE.

GERMAN PAPER SAYS CANADIAN TROOPS ARE NOT REALLY BRITISH

London, Oct. 29.—Among the fantastic falsehoods appearing in Krupp's journal, the Rheinische Westfälische Zeitung, of Essen, is an attempt to belittle the Canadian contingent. The article says the contingent is a nondescript medley, termed Canadian by courtesy, but, in reality, made up, in part, of such diverse elements as Red Indians, Russians, Servians, Montenegrins, Frenchmen and Belgians. The diatribe only excites amusement, though a strong desire is expressed in the public press that the metropolis should have the earliest possible opportunity of welcoming the Canadians. A correspondent of the Daily Mail, signing himself "Compatriot," says:

"Where are the Canadian troops? I understand they have been smuggled out with the same secrecy, without the nation being allowed to thank them, by a great demonstration, for the noble aid brought to Britain in the hour of supreme danger. Representative units marching through London would receive such a welcome as would echo throughout the whole world and show that the British people have grateful hearts."

HEBREWS WILL AID WAR RELIEF FUNDS

Vancouver, Oct. 29.—Under the auspices of the Vancouver Zionists, a mass meeting was held Sunday afternoon in the meeting place of the Sons of Israel, in support of the war relief fund. The Hebrews do not intend to help only the one big fund, but various other funds which have been organized to raise money for the sufferers of the war. A greater part of the Jewish offering, it is expected, will go to the Belgian relief fund, as the Belgians at the present time are the most needy, but the other funds will not be overlooked.

The meeting was well attended and short addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Goldberg, Mr. Roy Alexander and Mr. Franks. A collection was taken up and quite a large sum was realized. A house to house canvass of Hebrew residents will be made.

PROVINCE ATTAINS OBJECT IN APPEAL

Edmonton, Oct. 25.—Premier Sifton stated yesterday that the decision of the Privy Council, in the case of the appeal of the Attorney-General of Alberta against the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada in the case in which the right was refused the Canadian Northern Western Railway (C. N. R.) to cross the right-of-way of the Canadian Pacific at Rocky Mountain was virtually a win for the province.

His reason for this deduction was because the responsibility of deciding such cases will now be put on the Dominion Railway Commission. The Privy Council says that power to decide lies with the commission, which was what the province of Alberta wanted, more than to have the particular case in question decided favorably.

FRENCH RESERVIST BRINGS OPTIMISTIC NEWS FROM EUROPE

ALLIES ARE NOT AT LAST RESOURCES BY ANY MEANS—HIMSELF TOLD TO WAIT—GERMAN'S FOOD SUPPLY RAPIDLY DIMINISHING.

Edmonton, Oct. 28.—Today, more than ordinarily, one savors of good news, and a gentleman who has just come to Edmonton after a five-months' stay in London brings with him a number of decidedly cheerful items of information.

He says, among other things, that the imperial authorities were not publishing the most optimistic statements, but that, on the contrary, they were exceedingly careful that the most cheerful of them were deleted by the censors. France, he declares, has not called out all her resources in men. He himself, a French reservist, was told, when he offered his services, to hold himself in readiness, but wait.

"Another interesting statement he makes is that all eyes in the financial world in the Old Country are turned to the millions of arable acres in the Canadian West, and he expects that, as soon as the dread of German militarism is removed, there will be an immense influx of money for investment to this country."

"Canadians are allowing themselves to be depressed to a much greater extent than in the British Isles," he says. "The money now being expended does not infringe much, if any, on capital account, but is only about equal to the amount usually available in a normal year."

"In the Old Country the majority of the people seem to look forward to a certain cessation of war before next Easter. Even the Germans, so far as I could learn, see in their military expenditures and their manufacturing industries absolute burdens, because expected sources of food supply have failed and her own supplies are being rapidly diminished and will soon be at the vanishing point."
