Troopship R. M. S. Virginian. Quebec, Sept, 30, 1914. We are aboard ship and at anchor about a mile above the Citadel waiting for the rest of the ships to be loaded. As we were about the twenty-fifth in loading it will not be long before we are under way. There will be twentyeight ships and fifteen battleships, cruisers and destroyersso they tell us-in the fleet when we cross. From our position in the river we can see eleven ships waiting at anchor, but none of the convoy.
