## REBEL BOURASSA FINDING EXCUSES FOR THE KAISER

Says Germany is Not the Only Country Which Has Invaded a Smaller One.

Montreal, Oct. 29.—"Whether victory rests with England, or Germany, or France, Belgium will survive as Ireland, as Poland and as French Canada have survived," said Henry Bourassa, leader of the Nationalists, at a patriotic meeting of the St. Jean Baptiste Society held here. Mr. Bourassa also criticized those who want Canadians to unite as the Belgians have united in face of the invader by the remark that people forget that Belgians are fighting for their own country.

Mr. Bourassa proceeded to show that France had invaded Belgium a great many times and that Germany was not the only nation that persecuted small nations, for he declared the greatest barbarism had been practiced in Ireland that the world had ever seen since Christ came to earth. "Belgium," he said, "has in the past rebelled against and distrusted the imperial tendencies of England, Germany and France, and if she had leaned finally towards Britain in preference to Germany, it was because there was a stretch of water between them"—a sentiment that was cheered by the small audience.
