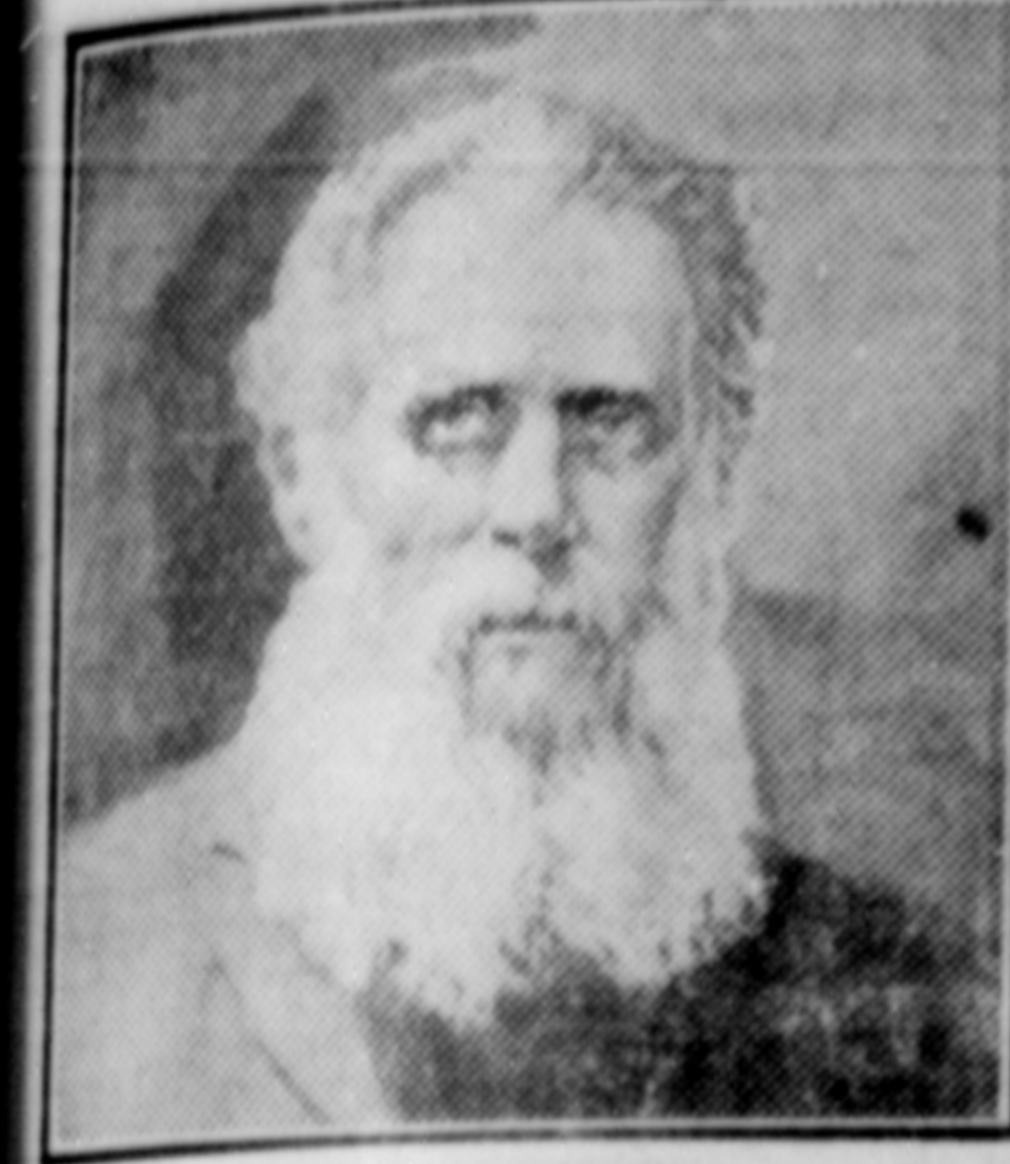

## RUSSIAN TROOPS ARE LIKE PURITANS

Water is Usual Beverage—They Go Into Battle With Absolute Faith.

Petrograd, Oct. 29.—The well known war correspondent and writer, Nemirovich Danchenko, who saw fighting in the Russo-Turkish and the Russo-Japanese wars, communicates his impressions to The Russo-Koestovo. He says:  
"One must be blind not to see the enormous progress that has been made by Russia and the Russian army in the last ten years. There has not occurred a single disgraceful scene such as those that sullied the Manchurian campaign.  
"There is no waste of strength. Everybody is in order and everybody is serious and in his place. Russia now has a sober, self-denying army, ably controlled by a modest and businesslike staff. Emperor William used to accuse the Russian officers of drunkenness. The reproach now applies most certainly to the Germans.  
"The Russian troops are today like Puritans, going into battle with absolute faith, having dined meagerly. Water is the usual beverage of their Spartan board."

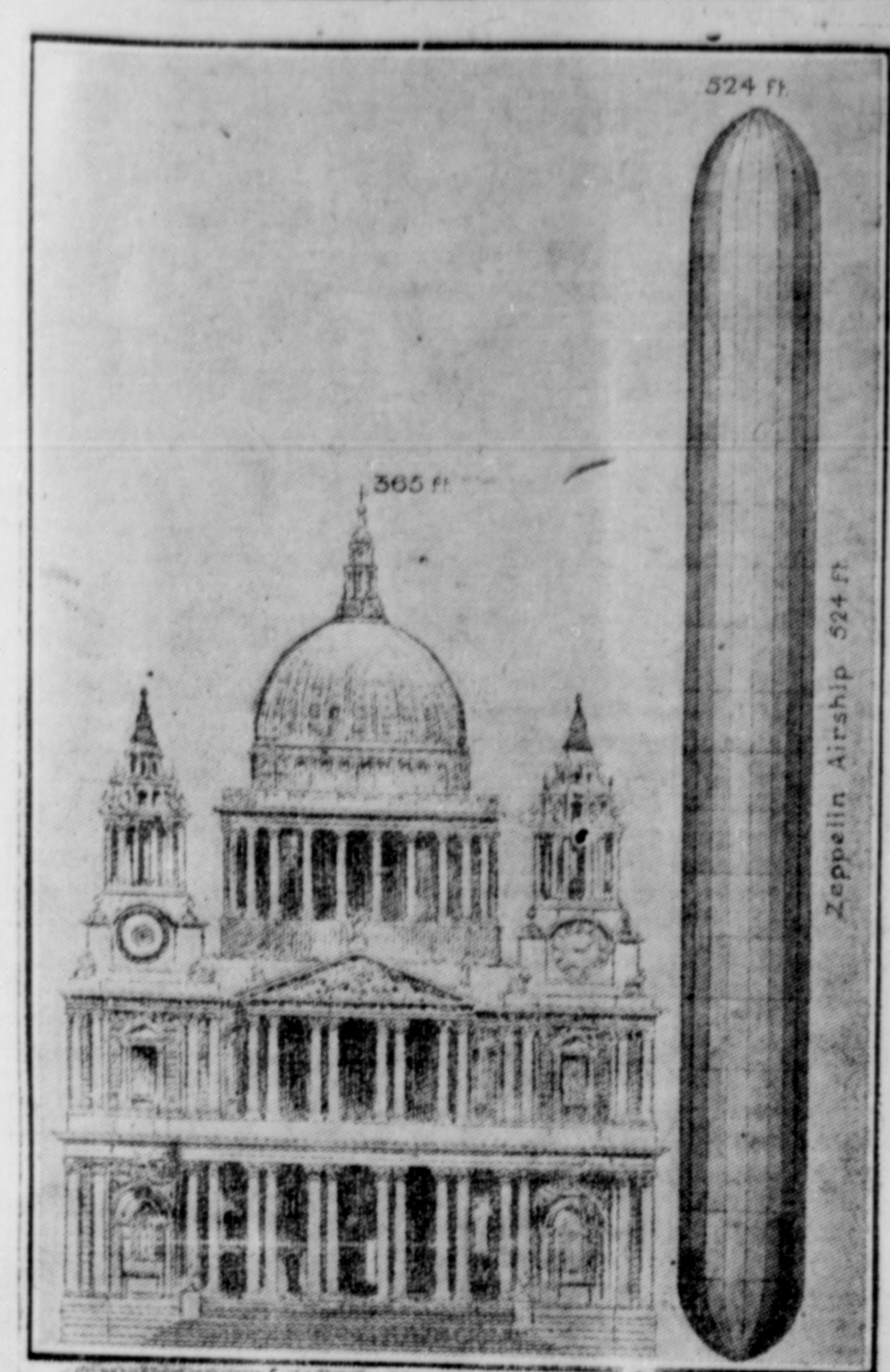

## BRITAIN OUTWITS HER ENEMIES OVER SUGAR

BY A MASTER STROKE OF "STATE SOCIALISM" CORNERS THE WORLD'S SUPPLY AND THEN PROHIBITS IMPORTATION OF GERMAN SUGAR.

London, Oct. 30.—An official statement issued this evening says that the government has prohibited the importation of sugar into the United Kingdom with the object of preventing German and Austrian sugar from reaching here.  
Those familiar with the sugar question realize that this means that by one master stroke of what might be termed "State Socialism," the British government has dealt a hard blow to the sugar trade of its enemy, and has secured an adequate supply at reasonable prices from the world's resources for the people of the British Isles.  
To make the move that at first sight looked the reverse of what it will imply, the creation of cheap sugar in the British Isles, plain and clear, the official press bureau has issued a statement. In effect the situation is this: when the war broke out, sugar was almost unreasonably dear because manufacturers realized they depended for the major part of their supplies upon Germany and Austria, great sugar beet growing countries.  
Germany Was Fooled  
Britain had a fine fruit crop that was spoiling on the trees because a famine of sugar was feared. The German government, fully awake to the blow they could deal to Britain, at once rushed in and prohibited the export of sugar to neutral countries in order that it might strike at Britain. When events revealed that this would be a boomerang, spelling ruin to the agriculturalists of Germany and Austria, the embargo was lifted. German sugar at once found its way to surrounding neutral countries, Holland, Switzerland, Denmark, Norway and Sweden, and dealers in sugar in these countries, saw the high British market beckoning temptingly, and ripe with profit, overseas.  
Then Britain assayed its master stroke. It appointed a Royal commission, which, after making itself a huge sugar agent, to scrape sugar from all quarters of the globe, except from the countries with which Britain was at war, pledged all the great refineries to deal solely with it. It then "cornered" the world's available stock. The result is that the British public will now be able for a whole year at least to buy sugar in retail at 7 1-2c and 8 1-2c for good cubes. And as Britain previously consumed most of Germany's sugar, the effect on its trade can be imagined.

## TO GROW MORE WHEAT.

How Australia Will Help Empire and Provide Work for the Unemployed.

London, Oct. 31.—Sydney messages indicate that the Australian government proposes going beyond the proposals made by the Saskatchewan farmers and to guarantee a fixed minimum price of four shillings per bushel for all wheat of newly cultivated areas, also to guarantee 20 per cent of the bank advances for the clearance of new land and to supply seed wheat. It is expected one million extra acres, at least, will be cropped next year, thus partially solving the unemployment difficulty.

## JAPANESE NURSES HAVE LEFT FOR THE RUSSIAN FRONT

Washington, D. C., Oct. 30.—Japan's first activity in the European war zone will be to care for the Russian wounded, it was stated at the Japanese embassy today. Advices from Tokio were that several units of the Japanese Red Cross Society, both physicians and nurses, have left Tokio for Petrograd.
