APPLIES THAT COMPANY BE PUBLICLY WOUND UP

Vancouver, Oct. 28.—Mr. Albert Maxton, a merchant of Calais, France, through his Vancouver attorney, Mr. J. B. Mathers, has filed a petition in the Supreme Court to have the Dominion Trust Company wound up under the supervision of the Supreme Court of British Columbia. According to Mr. Mathers, Mr. Maxton was a wealthy man before the war broke out, but since then his lace factory has been closed down and he is now depending on getting his money from the trust company for a living.

The petition sets forth that as trustee for the petitioner, the Dominion Trust Company sold to Mr. George E. Drew, of New Westminster, in 1902, certain lands and premises for \$130,000; and although the petitioner demanded a conveyance of the land and premises, an assignment of the agreement and an accounting and payment of monies due under the agreement, the company would not accede to his request and an action was commenced in the Supreme Court on September 20.

The petition asks for a public winding up under the court instead of the company being allowed to wind up voluntarily. A request is made that the court appoint the Standard Trust Company or Mr. George E. Winters, of Riddell, Stead, Hodges & Winters, auditors, or some other fit and proper company as provisional liquidator of the company.

The petition will come before Chief Justice Hunter later in the week.

OTTOMAN GOVERNMENT BLAMES GERMAN CREWS FOR BLACK SEA ATTACK

Washington, D. C., Oct. 31.—The Turkish Minister of Finance informed the French ambassador at Constantinople yesterday that the raid of Turkish warships on Russian seaports took place without the knowledge of the Ottoman government and was presumably made under the influence of the German officers and crew. This information was conveyed in a dispatch today from Ambassador Morgenthau to the American government.

GENERAL VON MOLTKE OVERCOMING ILLNESS

German Staff Chief's Condition Reported Greatly Improved.

Amsterdam, via London, Oct. 30.—The condition of General von Moltke, chief of the German General Staff, who is suffering from an affection of the liver, is greatly improved, according to a dispatch from Berlin.

GEN. POCHHAMMER DIES LEADING ARMY

German Commander Killed in Battle in Forest.

Berlin, via The Hague to London, Oct. 30.—In the casualty list just issued appears the name of Major General Pochhammer, who was killed October 4 while leading his troops in the forest of the Argonne.

EAGER TO BE AT FRONT.

Canadians Not Eager for Ceremonial March Through London.

London, Oct. 30.—The Daily Mail continues its crusade for a march of the Canadians through London. The new suggestion is that they march before or after the King's carriage in the royal procession at the opening of Parliament, on November 11. Many Canadians, however, say Canada wants no better example than the flower of the British army, which went to the front without flag-waving or cheering. Their one desire, at the present moment, is to get quickly to the front.

Major General Sam Hughes is to be entertained at the Royal Automobile Club tonight by Col. Grant Morden, to meet the British ministers and leading Englishmen. Lord Kitchener hopes to look in during the evening.
