THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE NOW NUMBERS 300,000 MEN

LORD KITCHENER IS SENDING NO TROOPS TO THE FRONT
WHO ARE NOT EFFICIENT AND WELL ABLE
TO FIGHT.

Paris, Nov. 9.—No fewer than
300,000 British soldiers are un-
der the orders of Field Marshal
Sir John French on the firing
lines. Beyond these there were
many auxiliary troops on duty at
the transport and supply base.
This army acts as a complete
unit in conjunction with British
and French comrades under the
command of General Joffre. The
fresh base is near a port on the
English channel and the field of
action of the British troops is
near the Belgian frontier and in
Belgium itself. Virtually all
the British soldiers in the field
have seen a certain amount of
service, any amount of them had
from ten to twelve years' training
and have participated in Great
Britain's little wars in various
parts of the world. The gaps in
their ranks are filled by re-en-
listed men who have hastened
back to the army at Lord Kitchen-
er's call.

By December 1, this year, when
it is expected that large bodies of
British Territorials, who have
volunteered for foreign service,
will have been trained sufficiently
to take the field, it is estimated
that the force at Sir John
French's disposal will have
reached 500,000 men. These
will include the British and na-
tive troops from India, and por-
tions of the garrisons at Malta
and Gibraltar. By that time also
many of the Australian, Canadian

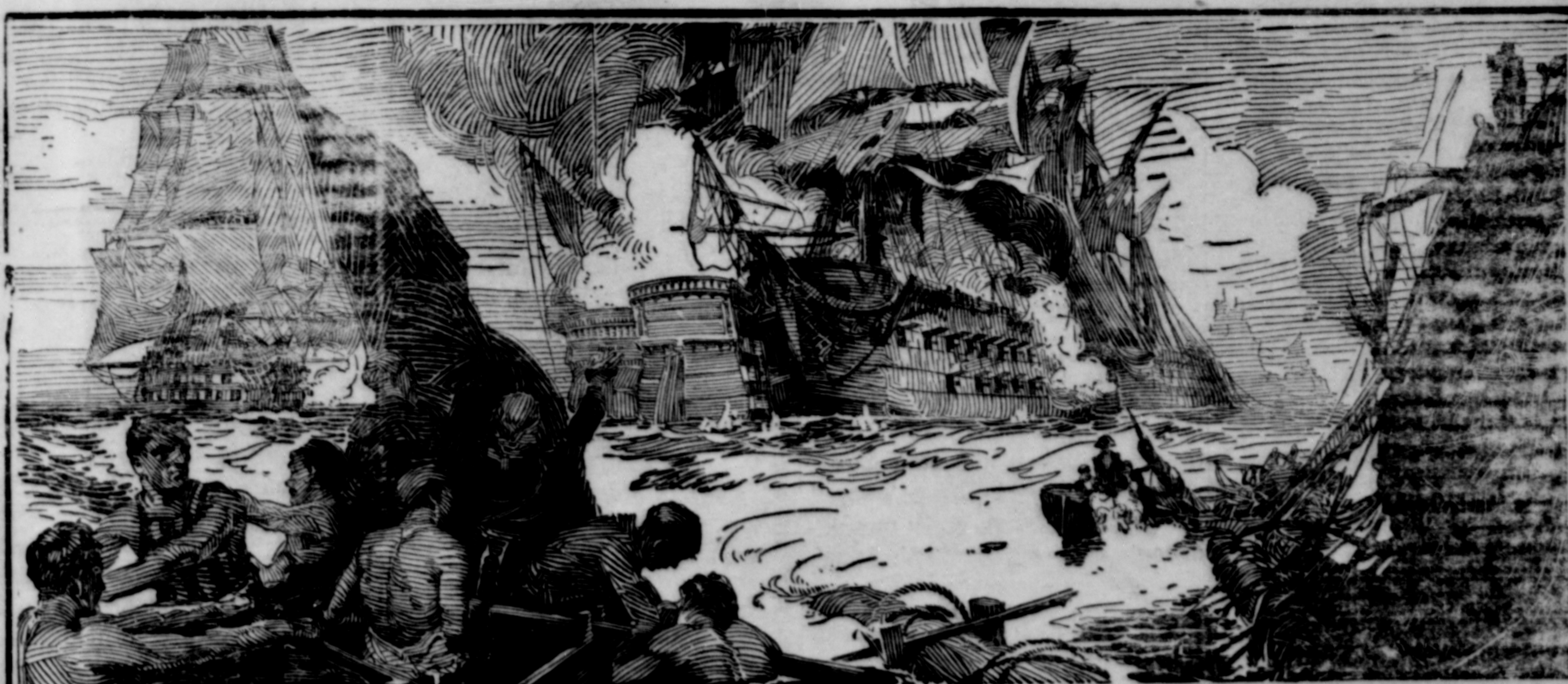
