IGNORING BELGIUM

BEFORE THE WAR German-American Defenders of Teutonic Actions Conveniently Forget Savage Treatment of Little Country.

> Toronto, Nov. 18 .- Professor J. G. Hume, head of the department of philosophy and psychology in Toronto University, who formerly studied under Prof. Munsterberg, of Harvard, in an address on the war delivered last night strongly scored the German-American defenders of the Teutonic position in the present

> The German theologians who had put forward a defence of the war had, he said, altogether omitted to explain the invasion of Belgium, an omission which destroyed the defence. Prof. Munsterberg's argument that the "Yellow Peril" was working hand in hand with pan-Slavism and that the United States should unite with Germany to combat this danger, was declared to be an unmitigated falsehood.

That the war was largely due to Great Britain's jealousy of Germany as a commercial competitor was declared to be withain's policy being diametrically opposed to any such policy, her markets having been thrown open
