## LADIES APPOINTED LIEUTENANTS FOR SPECIAL SERVICES

London, Nov. 24.—The Misses Plummer and Arnold, who were appointed by Major General Sam Hughes, Canadian Minister of Militia, to take charge of field comforts of the Canadian contingent, have been given the rank of lieutenants for special services. Field comforts now needed by the men here specially are cholera belts, sleeping caps, socks and mufflers in great number, also cigarettes, pipes and other Christmas presents. All these should be sent to Miss Plummer. Field comforts for the Canadian contingent at Salisbury and subscriptions for the same fund should be sent to Miss Arnold. The authorities are anxious to give this publicity throughout the Dominion.

## FRANCE SENDS BIG ORDERS TO CANADA

Montreal, November 23.—That France has already ordered an immense amount of goods for its army in Canada and intends to order more was made known today by A. E. Forget, ex-president of the Republique Francaise Society in this city. Mr. Forget offered his services to the French government as a volunteer, going to France for that purpose, but was sent back to purchase goods for the republic here. Mr. Forget says that already 300,000 pairs of shoes and 500,000 suits of underwear have been ordered in Canada and that future orders will include the same outfits, several thousand horses, leather, sheepskins, canvas, khaki cloth and preserves.

## REOPENING OF STOCK EXCHANGE POSTPONED

New York, Nov. 23.—The officials of the stock exchange announced this afternoon that, because of unforeseen difficulties the plan to re-open the exchange for dealing in bonds has been indefinitely postponed. Earlier in the day, it was officially stated that trading in this class of securities would be resumed on Saturday subject to minimum prices.

## COLLEGE BOYS SAME ALL WORLD OVER

Seattle, Nov. 23.—To avenge the tying up of two of their classmates by freshmen, forty sophomores of the University a few nights ago captured nearly a hundred men of the first year class, carried them out in autos on Bothell Road, from six to ten miles from the campus, tied each man, painted his hair green, administered a hearty "hot-hand" and left him to get untied and get back to the campus as best he could. At an early hour of the morning only one or two of the freshmen had straggled in, and rescuing parties were sent out by the first year men to set them at liberty.

The two sophomores tied last week were caught painting out some freshman numerals.

Interclass fights have been placed under the ban by the faculty, and this fall the annual tie-up was eliminated for the first time in many years. Most of the plotters were masked.

## "SPY!" YELLS UHLAN, WAVING DIVA'S TROUSERS

Maggie Teyte, Arrested in Germany, is Looted of Her Chic Knickerbockers.

New York, Nov. 23.—Maggie Teyte, tiny songbird, is back from Europe—and without her trousers. Uhlan's got them.

It was a year ago that the diva landed from the Kronprinz Wilhelm and was discovered to be wearing a dainty Norfolk jacket and knickerbockers.

## BELLA COOLA NOTES

The arrival of the Camosun on Saturday instead of Sunday was a welcome change to the people of this community. We wish to draw the attention of our readers to the new schedule of sailings whereby the steamer Chelohsin will leave Vancouver each Monday, arriving at this port on Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Joseph Connors, of Namu, has spent the past week in town as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. W. Sutherland. Mr. Connors, who for some time was the chief officer in charge of the Venture, was in charge of the Draney Fisheries tug Bertha D during the past fishing season.

Mr. Karl Brink, of Hagensborg, has taken up residence in the town. He intends shortly to make a trip to Talio in order to purchase, same cattle which he will bring back here for butchering.

Mr. A. C. Christensen left for Takush Harbor by the last southbound steamer. He is expected back in the course of a week or two.

Mr. Fred Smith came in from South Bentinck during the week to put in a tender for the contract of cutting and delivering piles for the government wharf.

About six tons of miscellaneous vegetables were shipped to the Belgian consul at Victoria on Sunday last.

By the Camosun last Saturday there arrived a number of Angora goats consigned to Mr. John Cresswell, of Atnarko. Mr. Cresswell has one of the finest locations in the upper valler and it is hoped he will make a success of his new venture.

M. Smaby, of Ocean Falls, came up on Wednesday and stayed over for a day. He was on his way to South Bentinck Arm to look over the camp and timber limits of the Ocean Falls Co. Mr. Smaby informs us that all the logs that were on hand at the time the large mills ceased operation, amounting to something like ten million feet, have been disposed of. Large quantities of cedar and fir logs were sent to mills in Washington. The hemlock and spruce went mostly to Powell River to be used in the manufacture of paper.

G. G. Davis, the originator of the construction of ocean-going rafts, has been at Ocean Falls in charge of the work of despatching logs to their destination. These ocean-going rafts are constructed 100 feet in length, 70 feet wide, 16 feet deep, and are bound together to stand any kind of sea. The work of getting the logs away from Ocean Falls was managed with splendid success and proves the immense advantage of the new method of raft construction.

NEW TITLE FOR ALBERT

Great Personal Bravery of Belgian Ruler to Be Recognized.

Paris, Nov. 23.—A high diplomat here is authority for the statement that a proposal is afoot to confer on the King of Belgium the title of King of Jerusalem as the only fitting reward for his great personal bravery in leading his army under fire. This action, which will be taken after the war, means divesting the Emperor of Austria of this title, which has been an appendage of the Kings of Hungary since 1290.
