PIONEER ASSOCIATION HAS ISSUED BOOKLET

The souvenir book of the Prince Rupert Pioneer Association has just been turned off the presses of The Daily News, and is a credit not only to the promoters but to the city of Prince Rupert.

While the work was carried out under the patronage of the Pioneer Association the actual work, both in plan and detail, was carried out by Messrs. Geo. B. Fredell and C. C. Fraser, two young men who have given considerable of their time to that line of business, and who have spent the last six months in Prince Rupert.

The mechanical work was done by P. R. Harris and G. S. Russell, of the News Job, and all who have seen it are confident that better work could not have been done in the larger cities.

There are pictures of some two hundred old-timers, as well as many of the local public buildings and private residences. Scenes from the early days of the city are there and will be valuable as a souvenir to those who were here in the early days of the city as well as late-comers.

There is an historical sketch showing the development of the city and a short biography beside the picture of each old-timer showing the part he has played since coming to Prince Rupert. The book is printed on the best quality of 100-lb. paper and is both durable and artistic.

Perhaps the most fitting part in the whole booklet is the dedication to the memory of the late Charles M. Hays, whose foresight and prophetic outlook first grasped the strategic advantage of Prince Rupert.

NEW UNIFORM FOR THE FRENCH ARMY

Light Blue-Gray in Color, Though Cloth is Called Tri-Color.

Calais, Dec. 12.—Trains have been coming through Calais full of soldiers in an unfamiliar uniform of light blue-gray color. This is the new French field service uniform which is beginning to make its appearance. It is being issued to the class of 1914 and some of the older troops who are being re-equipped.

To make up for the blow to the sensibilities of French patriots which the disappearance of the old red trousers and blue tunic will naturally cause, red and white threads are woven into the blue, and the cloth is called tri-color. The blue-gray is an excellent shade for escaping notice, and will blend particularly well with the gray winter landscapes in which the troops are now fighting.

NEW SUPERDREADNOUGHT H. M. S. ACME IS READY

There has been an important addition made to the forces of the British fleet. The H. M. S. Acme, of the latest type of superdreadnought, has just been turned out of the shops. It will also be interesting to know that this ship has been built in Prince Rupert and that she can even now be seen in the windows of the Acme Importers, Ltd., on Second Avenue. The H. M. S. Acme has two 12-inch guns, six 6-inch and eight quick firers. She has three funnels and all the equipment of a first class modern warship. A visit to this ship is worth while. The whole window is a blaze of patriotic emblems. The shells used in the dreadnought are not cannon balls, but Xmas bargains, and they are all hummers.
