OVERSEAS CONTINGENT GETS XMAS HOLIDAY

non-commissioned officers' lectures have been temporarily suspended and will not be resumed until after the holiday season. One of the interesting drills for the men from the north the past week was tent pitching, under the immediate supervision of the adjutant and the company officers. The whole strength of the battalion was also out one night for a route march from 8 p. m. till nearly midnight. Each day sees something new inaugurated and the men are kept constantly busy.

Lieut. W. Bullock-Webster, of the Earl Grey's Own Rifles, who is taking a qualifying course at Work Point Barracks, is a frequent visitor at the Willows Camp and is following with interest the work of the Prince Rupert contingent.

The weather has been cold and frosty, but the days are filled with glorious sunshine, making it possible to hold the drills out of doors. One wonders where else in Canada such an ideal spot could have been selected as that of the Willows Camp, with its numbers of spacious buildings, for a winter training camp. One of its big structures alone provides sleeping quarters for over 700 men. Every one of the exhibition buildings are occupied and the British Columbia Horse are accommodated in tents. There are over 2,000 men in training, as besides the 30th Battalion of the Canadian Overseas Contingent, the B. C. Horse has 500 men and the Fifth Garrison Artillery, 50th Highlanders and the 88th Fusiliers are bringing their units up to strength in preparation for the third contingent.

Today's orders contain the discharge of Private Hugh Philpot, who is leaving for England to resume his commission in his former unit—a territorial regiment. Mrs. Philpot will accompany him.

SOLDIERS' FRANCHISE.

Question of Franchise of Men Who Go to Front to Be Considered in Parliament.

Ottawa, Dec. 26.—One of the questions which will have to be considered at the next session of Parliament will be the franchise of the Canadian soldiers who are on active service or have enlisted for service abroad. New Zealand recently held a general election, and the members of the Overseas contingents were allowed to vote abroad. Incidentally, in New Zealand there was no cry of disloyalty because of a general election. Whether the New Zealand plan could be followed for the Canadian Overseas army is a question which has not yet been decided. There are difficulties in the way, and when the men reach the trenches the question of voting might be impossible. Ballots would have to be sent forward and the men allowed to vote according to their declared homes. However, if nothing else is done, it is likely steps will be taken to protect the franchises of all soldiers so that they will not be struck off the lists while absent.

CHIEF JUSTICE SCORES THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

of the provincial act, I think.

Mr. Martin—I merely copied it from the other provinces. It is the ordinary act. But when I was Attorney General I lived up to it; now it does not seem to be lived up to. My legal point is that Mr. Bowser is a barrister of this court, and I am sure that this court will not allow him, while acting head of the department of justice with the right to appoint or dismiss these magistrates, to also act for accused against these magistrates. It is a gross outrage on the administration of justice, and on this court. These Chinamen go to Bowser, Reid & Wallbridge and give them a huge sum, say \$1,000, and say, "Here, you get us off." Why do they do that? Why do they go to the firm that the Attorney General is in? Is it to get ordinary legal advice? No; they go to the firm where the man who put them in jail is a partner, thinking that he can get them better justice—or what they think is justice—than an ordinary legal firm that merely argues points of law.

"Tainted at Fountain Head."

Chief Justice Hunter—It seems to me to be a grave state of affairs. Here is a case where an officer charged with the administration of justice is taking proceedings to have convictions made by his own officers set aside. The Attorney General has an interest in this firm. The whole thing to my mind is tainted. It is tainted at the fountain head. I never saw a clearer case of where interest conflicts with duty. He should not be allowed to act in criminal convictions.


Mr. Ritchie again protested that the matter had been brought to him in the ordinary way of his business, and that no injustice or impropriety had been or could be done by his appearance.

Chief Justice Hunter, however, remained firm. "This is a case where the Attorney General's partner is taking steps to secure the release of a convict, and I cannot give him an audience. If you start new proceedings apart from the firm of Bowser, Reid & Wallbridge, I may give you the right to an audience," he said, in dismissing the application with costs.

Later, Mr. Ritchie, on an ex parte motion, secured an order nisi for certiorari to review the evidence taken at the trials.

"Remember, you are taking it at your own risk," warned the chief justice. "You can see from what has transpired this morning that it will be necessary for you to see that your material is in proper order." The matter was adjourned to come up again on January 4.


"I remember how enthusiastic a stamp collector you are. This is a new issue and, as one of the first out, it is worth keeping."


"We are starving."
