# The Housekeeper is Right


Sometimes a housekeeper requires a quick leavening agent, and finds she has no baking powder.

The Chatham sent a launch up this river about seven miles. She suddenly came ing at once, and hit one man on from a distance of twelve miles without being able to see her. Ac. cording to some natives several shells hit her. They also struck a mail steamer called the Somali. which was full of ammunition and stores. She caught fire, and has been destroyed. A shell also hit a steam launch going from the Konigsberg to the Somali and

> "November 12 .- I have just got news of the Konigsberg. H. M. S. Chatham went back to the Kelwa River with the collier. The Ko. nigsberg had come down in the night to the mouth of the river. and was anchored there just round a point. The Chatham bombarded her with 6-inch guns. and the Konigsberg went back up the river six miles. The collier had armor plate put all around the chart house where all her men would be. They put the Royal Naval Reserve men on her. and sent her up the river, followed by the Duplex, a smaller boat, which was to take the men off the collier when they were ready to sink her. All the way up the river they were fired on from both sides with 3-pound guns. The Duplex was like a pepper box. The armor plate saved the naval men. They got the collier up to the narrowest part of the river, and left for the Duplex. A hole was blown in the collier by means of an electric wire, and she was sunk in the right place. Two of our men were killed and fourteen wounded. One of the R. N. R. officers, Lieutenant Triggs, had a shell pass right through his shoulder, and I am afraid that the arm will have to be amputated."
