Deiches is one of eleven defendants arrested by the Department of Justice agents in an effort to break up an alleged conspiracy to furnish German army officers and reservists with American passports which would enable them to return to Germany from this country without danger of molestation of French and English authorities. United 3 States District Attorney Marshall said that Deiches, prior to arraignment, had waived immunity and made a statement.
