GERMANS LOST TWO CRUISERS IN FIGHT

London, Jan. 28.—The German cruiser Kilberg, it is now reported, has been sunk as a result of Sunday's battle in the North Sea. So says an official statement just made.

Admiral Beatty has made his report on the battle and states that the battle cruisers Lion and Tiger were only slightly damaged. The enemy was very badly battered.

German prisoners taken stated that the Kolberg sank en route to Heligoland.

The conduct of the British officers and crew, says the report, was only what was to be expected.

HORRIBLE CRIME DONE BY FIEND IN MONTREAL

Police Scarcely Able to Save Alleged Perpetrator From Lynching.

Montreal, Jan. 28.—A crime rivaling in atrocity any in the records of the Montreal police was committed on Friday night, when a man brutally attacked and mutilated in the most horrible fashion a 13-year-old Jewish boy named Antonio Westowski, who had been rendered unconscious by the administration of carbolic acid. The case is of such a horrible nature that the police have refused to give all of the details in their reports. Westowski is believed by the doctors to be dying, and his ante-mortem statement has been taken.

Joseph Bisson, alias Joseph Joseph Archambault, 46 years of age, is charged with the outrage. The police had difficulty in saving him from lynching by infuriated friends of the boy when the crime became known. Bisson has already served a term of five years for an unmentionable offense.

NAVY PERSONNEL IS 10,000 SHORT

Shortage of Officers and Men Regarded as Alarming by Admiral Fletcher

Washington, Jan. 27.—An "alarming" shortage of officers and men needed to man the warships of the United States for battle is reported by Rear Admiral Fletcher, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet, in a letter to the house naval committee made public tonight.

Writing to supplement his recent testimony before the committee the admiral announces that an inquiry just completed by special boards has revealed that the navy lacks by 10,000 the men to fully man all the ships which ought to be commissioned upon the outbreak of war.

Boards Make Estimates

Boards consisting of the captain and other ranking officers of experience, by order of the navy department, the letter says, "have been appointed upon every battleship of the Atlantic fleet with instructions to carefully consider the complements of both officers and men required in the various types of vessels, and scrutinize the number allowed in each rank and rating, with a view to reducing the same to the lowest basis practicable consistent with efficiency for a peace complement and the lowest number that would be desirable for a war complement.

Shortage of 5,219

"The report of these boards show that in the twentyone battleships in commission, and now composing the Atlantic fleet, there is a shortage of 5,219 men and 339 officers required to fill all the stations necessary to efficiently fight the ships in battle. "The foregoing figures refer to the commissioned battle fleet alone and this shortage does not include 4,000 or 5,000 additional to fully man the ships, which I think ought to be fully manned

upon the opening of hostilities, as stated in my testimony.

"My complete report has been sent to the secretary of the navy."

For Army Officer Reserve

An army officer reserve of at least 30,000 men, to be trained at military schools, one in every state, at two-thirds federal and one-third state expense, is contemplated in the McKellar bill, favorably reported today from the house military committee. Secretary Garrison, in a letter to the committee, approved the bill.

Abolition of the naval "plucking" board is proposed in the Witherspoon bill, favorably reported to the house today by the naval affairs committee.
