ROCKEFELLER GIFTS HAVE USED A "PULL"

New York, Feb. 5 .- Rockefeller Germany. donations to educational intsitutions have influenced the policies of presidents of universities and colleges in many instances, but the influence has always been good, according to Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard University, a witness at the continuation of the Federal Industrial Commission's inquiry into philanthropic foundations and the causes of social unrest.

These donations, Mr. Eliot said. to which he referred were made by the General Education Board. As an instance he cited John D. Rockefeller's offer in 1908 to furnish one million dollars to Harvard University if the university would raise \$875,000 additional.

New Austrian Foreign Minister Anxious to Save Dual Monarchy.

SEEK EARLY PEACE

London, Feb. 5 .- The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Copenhagen asserts that Baron Burian, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, at his recent meeting with the German Emperor, drew a doleful picture of the plight of the dual monarchy and urged that the time had arrived for the Germanic powers to consider most seriously the possibilities for a tolerable peace.

The Daily Mail attaches great importance to the dispatch, which is dated Thursday week and was delayed in transmission. The dispatch says further:

"Baron Burian, whose sole object it is to save what can be saved of the dual monarchy, represented to the Germans that the situation in Austria was precarious and that if the Russian advance on Budapest is not stopped the effect may very probably be the downfall of Austria and the complete collapse of Hungary, which must later entail as a logical sequence also the downfall of

"Therefore Baron Burian urged that the Russians must at all costs be repulsed and that Germany must send large reinforcements to Hungary to prevent a catastrophe. In any case, he said, it was doubtful if it would be possible for them to resist the Russians and Servians and perhaps the Roumanians. Therefore it was necessary seriously to examine into the question of peace.

"A definite defeat would mean a debacle for Austria-Hungary and the partition of the empire. His advice to Germany was to consider most seriously the possibilities of a tolerable peace. He advised Germany not to reject fundamentally the thought of peace on the grounds of a probable disarmament of Europe. If Germany were disposed to treat on such terms he believed other conditions would be tolerable.

"The leading German statesmen admitted Baron Burian's intentions were excellent, and some of them justified by circumstances, but they declared such a plan would be more ruinous to wages go as far as they should, Germany than Austria. Disarmament in Europe, they continued bought and ate too much meat. would only mean that Great Britain would police the whole world and Germany would have lost all chance for safeguarding her commerce, industrial and economic interests."

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
