WAR HAS SADDENED PRINCESS VON BUELOW

Intimate Friends at Rome Were
Wives of Allies' Ambassadors.

Rome, Feb. 1. (By mail).—The return home of Prince Von Buelow, ambassador from Germany to Rome, has brought more than diplomatic difficulties into the beautiful Villa Malta, home of the Von Buelows, in Via Porta Princiana.

The coming of Prince Von Buelow, who has taken the place of German Ambassador Von Plotow, has, of course, aroused much comment concerning Germany's subtlety in returning a man to Italy who has always showed so marked a love for Rome.

Comment, however, has not told the private and social sorrows of the Von Buelows, who do not hesitate to say how sad a home-coming this return to Villa Malta has been.

Before the war Princess Von Buelow claimed as her three most intimate friends: Lady Rodd, wife of Sir Rennell Rodd, British ambassador; Madame Barrere, wife of the French ambassador; and Madame Krupinski, wife of the Russian ambassador.

The fact that the Princess Von Buelow is an Italian adds to the unhappy situation of this return home. For Princess Von Buelow was the Princess Camporeale, step-daughter through her mother's second marriage, of the famous Marco Manghetti. And the real home of the Von Buelow's since the retirement of the prince as German Imperial Chancellor has been at Rome, in the historic Villa Malta, where kings have lived, and where, in the eighteenth century, the notorious Galgiostro in the midst of wealth and luxury performed his charlatan feats of necromancy. The Villa Malta, called the Villa of Roses, because of the gorgeous and exquisite riot of roses which cover the walls along the Via Porta Princiana, has been the scene of many diplomatic receptions; where the Sicilian princess, wife of the German prince, has been one of the most gracious hostesses in all Rome.

The only ambassador's home in which this princess may visit at present is that of the American embassy. Almost the first call made by Prince Von Buelow after his official call upon the King of Italy was upon the wife of the American ambassador.

The other day a meeting between Sir Rennell Rodd and Prince Von Buelow took place in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, in the presence of Ambassador Page. Both men, representatives of those two bitter national enemies, looked at each other, but they did not speak. Sir Rennell Rodd confessed afterwards his desire to take Von Buelow by the hand as in the old days, but he was afraid. "And so was Von Buelow afraid of you," commented Ambassador Page.

MEXICO ABOUT TO BE ABANDONED BY FOREIGN ENVOYS

Plans to Cut Country Off From
Family of Nations Seems
Ready to Launch.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Withdrawal from Mexico City of many foreign legations was imminent last night because of friction between the Carranza government and the diplomatic corps.

Some of the prominent diplomatic representatives of European countries already have cabled their home governments suggesting that in as much as communication is growing more and more restricted and little respect is given them by the Carranza authorities, it might be advisable to unite with other governments in a movement to abandon all foreign legations in Mexico.

As the American embassy has been closed, since the rupture with the Huerta government, the action on the part of the other diplomatic missions is being considered without consulting the United States, so far as is known.

The plan of the diplomatic corps in Mexico City, which is understood to be acting as a unit, is to leave affairs in Mexico in charge of consular officers. This would mean practically a severance of diplomatic relations by all countries and present a unique status for Mexico in the family of nations.

The situation in the Mexican capital has been replete with diplomatic embarrassments since the rapid changes in executive authority ensued. When General Carranza, in his capacity as first chief of the Constitutional army, first abandoned Mexico City and moved his capital to Vera Cruz, he invited the diplomatic corps to accompany him. The diplomats declined, asserting that such a step might be construed as a recognition of his government. Since then the relation between them and Carranza have not been cordial. It has been learned that there is a possibility of the embassies moving to Vera Cruz.

The return of the Carranza authority to Mexico City, where General Obregon is in command, has developed a menacing situation, because the latter has threatened, by direction of Carranza, to deport the Spanish minister unless Angel De Caso, who claims to be a confidential agent of the Spanish government, is surrendered from his hiding place in the Spanish legation. He is accused of complicity in the Villa movement.

Some of the embassies here tried a few days ago to communicate with their missions in Mexico City and had the cipher messages returned to them.

Since then there has been a modification of the embargo on code messages. So far as is known, Mexico City is quiet.

Villa Tells of Victories.

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 10.—General Villa has removed to Silao, Guanajuato. From that place he telegraphed a report upon the progress of his troops in various parts of Mexico. Villa has been joined by George C. Carothers, the American State Department representative.

Gen. Augustin Estrada, operating in Guanajuato, has defeated decisively a much stronger force of Carranza's troops, Villa's message said. He told also of fighting below San Luis Potosi in which Villa declared his forces practically had crushed the troops under Gen. Eulalio Gutierrez.
